A Regular Meeting of the Waverly City Council was held on May 1, 2017 at 7:00 P. M. at City Hall. Mayor Infelt presided and the following Council Members were present: Kangas, McKenzie, Reznicek, Sherer, and Waldstein. (Kangas arrived at 7:08 p.m.)

- A. Mayor Infelt called the meeting to order.
- B. Mayor Infelt led in the Pledge of Allegiance.
- C. Mayor Infelt led in prayer.
- D. Moved by Sherer, seconded by Reznicek to approve the agenda as presented.

- E. Moved by Waldstein, seconded by Sherer to approve the April 17, 2017 regular meeting minutes.

- F. Council welcomed Troy Toma as the Guest Councilperson for May.
- G. Public Hearings
 - 1. This was the date, time and place for a Public Hearing for the Waverly Comprehensive Land Use Plan Update (2017 Review) and Future Land Use Map Update as Amendments to the 2011 Waverly Comprehensive Plan Update.
 - There were no written or oral public comments.

The hearing was then closed.

Community Development and Zoning Specialist Ben Kohout explained that the Comprehensive Land Use Plan is updated every ten years, coinciding with the US Census. This update includes a full comprehensive assessment of the community. At this time, things that are looked at are the future and past and directions the City might plan to take. The plan is then reviewed approximately halfway to the next census. Brian Schoon of Iowa Northland Regional Council of Governments (INRCOG) added the City asked for assistance from INRCOG in looking at the goals and objectives of the 2011 plan. This involved making changes to either add or delete items. Some items that were completed were stricken. The areas on the map that are designated outside the City limits are areas that the City may, potentially, grow in that direction. Moved by Waldstein, seconded by McKenzie to approve Resolution 17-52, a Resolution adopting the Waverly Comprehensive Land Use Plan Update (2017 Review) and Future Land Use Map Update as amendments to the 2011 Waverly Comprehensive Land Use Plan.

 - Leisure Services Director Tab Ray noted that as part of a service day there would be 90 6th graders providing assistance to Trees Forever, SUFTA and City staff in planting 67 trees throughout the City in order to replace mostly Ash trees that have had to be removed due to the Emerald Ash Borer. Mr. Ray highlighted May 6 as a very busy day for Waverly with Art Walk having 36 vendors in Kohlmann Park, Tri-by-Knight Wartburg Triathalon is in the morning and will have 250 participants, and boys high school varsity soccer team is hosting the largest soccer tournament in the state. The girls varsity soccer team will host the same event on May 13. The Wartburg wrestling team and the Rotary Club will be re-sealing the Rail Trail Pedestrian Bridge on May 4 and 5. Maps and letters are being sent out to visitors and participants of the groups to let them know shopping will still be available in the downtown area. Downtown sidewalk days will also be May 6 so please use the back doors of the stores when visiting them.
