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7. Description

This single-family house is estimated to have been built in 1902 according to Bremer County Assessor records. The house form and style are consistent with houses in Waverly built at the turn of the 20th century. By the time the 1913 city directory was published, the address is listed as occupied by, Dr. Lester C. and Edith Kern. Newspaper listings show the Kerns moving to Waverly in December 1898 making construction of the house for their use several years later a likely possibility. A construction date of ca. 1901 is consistent with public records for this property and the brief occupancy of the house by original builder, Baptist minister P. Monroe Smock. A timeline for Smock's Waverly history and subsequent career is included at the end of Section 8. It was researched and prepared by Mary Meyer, local historian and Waverly HPC member, 11/8/2015.

This 2-story frame house is an example of a Hipped Roof, 2-story house form that retains design details from the Queen Anne Style and the overall form of the "American Four-Square" that became popular in lowa after the turn of the 20th century and continued to be built into the 1920s in Waverly. The house has a stone block foundation with narrow wood clapboard siding, corner boards and paired belt courses between levels. The low-pitched hipped roof on the main block has off-set gabled wall dormers on the front and side facades. Each of the gables is finished in octagonal-cut wood shingles that flare at the lower edges. A two-level entrance porch along the east façade includes an enclosed sunroom on the first floor and an enclosed sleeping porch on the upper level. The closed balustrades are clad in matching wood siding with 1/1 windows in the upper walls. The finish of the porch detailing suggests it was done as a part of the original design or within the first 15 years of the house's life, which included the period of greatest popularity for sleeping porches.

Fenestration throughout the house includes widely spaced single 1/1 double-hung windows of various sizes with more decorative sash on the front façade. On the first floor, a cottage window is located to the left of the entrance porch. It features a leaded glass design in the upper horizontal sash over the single square fixed sash. In the dormer gables, square fixed sash have a course of small square lights surrounding a large central light.

The property slopes up at the rear where a two-story hipped roof carriage barn was originally located. This was removed in ca. 2010.

Alterations: The house was converted to two apartments at an unknown date; the carriage barn at the rear of the property was razed sometime between ca. 1909 and 1911.

8. Significance

The Kern House at 702 1st Ave NW was originally built in ca. 1901 by Rev. P Smock, the local Baptist minister, and sold the following year to long-term occupants Lester C. and Edith Kern. It is an early example of the blending of a late 19th century architectural style with a new 20th turn-of the century building form. Queen Anne Style surface finishes – narrow clapboard siding, corner board trim, multiple belt courses, and decorative shingles – with the Hipped Roof, 2-story house form that became known as the "American Four-Square." The design gains additional significance because of the use of a sleeping porch integrated into the original form – a feature promoted for good health. The fact that the

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house was built for a medical doctor's family was likely more than a coincidence. Dr. Lester C. Kern's medical and surgical practice extended for 62 years in Waverly from 1899 to 1961. The house qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as an individually eligible and contributing resource to the historic district under Criteria A, B and C.

Dr. Lester C. Kern (1871-1967) graduated from the College of Medicine at the State University of Iowa (University of Iowa) in 1895. Dr. Kern moved to Waverly in December 1998 and he set up his medical office over Schaffer's Grocery in the downtown. In 1899 he was unmarried and resided at the Fortner House on East Bremer Avenue. After he and his wife Edith were married, they occupied this house beginning in ca. 1902. In 1901 he moved offices to the new Broadie Building above the Broadie Drug Store. A short time later it appears that Kern and his new wife began construction of their house on West Jefferson Street (1st Ave NW). In the 1913 city directory, Dr. Kern was listed as a "physician and surgeon." A noteworthy early procedure performed by Kern was a skin graft reported in local newspapers on October 29, 1903. Dr. Kern placed skin removed from a father to place on a burn site of the man's 18-month old son. In 1913, he became a charter member of the American College of Surgeons. He remained in active practice in 1955 at the age of 84 when Lester and Edith were still residing on 1st Ave NW. Dr. Kern closed his office on March 31, 1961 at the age of 90. Edith died in 1966 and Lester passed away on March 3, 1967.

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

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
