7. Description

This single-family house is estimated to have been built in 1897 according to Bremer County Assessor records. The house form and style are consistent with houses in Waverly built during the 1890s. Property transfer records show the parcel was acquired by Christian Haas in 1892 from Moritz Koeberle. Although the 1885 lowa Census shows the Koeberle family residing on this parcel, the dwelling is believed to be an earlier building based on the turn-of-the-century building design elements found in the current building. The 1899 city directory lists Gustave Haas, a single man, residing at an Elm Street address that could be this property. A construction date of ca. 1897 could be consistent with the house's granite hard head foundation and its leaded glass cottage windows, both of which appeared in other 1890s houses in Waverly. However, the occupancy of such a large house by a single man is unlikely. It is more likely that the house was not erected until 1900 when the property passed to Minnie Krause and her husband Charles. Newspaper accounts several times that year traced the progress on his house from excavation through occupation.

This large 2-story frame house is an example of a vernacular Side-Gable, 2-story house form sometimes referred to as a "Center Gable House" because of the inclusion of a gable wall dormer centered on the front façade. Examples of this style in lowa date from the 1860s to the turn of the 20th century. The Krause House has a red granite hard head foundation with medium width wood clapboard siding, corner board trim, and horizontal stickwork on the walls. The gable peaks have unusual molded panels featuring a raised diamond pattern with carved floral designs in lieu of shingle cladding. Horizontal stickwork is used as a belt course between each level and to form window lintels on the first and second levels. A low-pitched shed roof porch spans the full front façade with full-height square columns (likely replacements) evenly spaced across the front and a low-pitched pediment over the centered entrance steps. Its tympanum contains a sunburst panel design. The balustrade has been replaced with a wrought-iron railing and the skirting panels have been replaced with scroll cut vertical boards.

Fenestration throughout the house includes 1/1 double-hung windows of various sizes with a pair of matching feature windows on the front façade, first floor. These large cottage windows flank the centered entrance, each with a square single sash below topped by a wide horizontal sash above. The upper sash in each window has leaded lights with a geometric pattern surrounding a radiating oval. The front entrance door has a tall plate glass light. A pair of closely spaced 1/1 double-hung units are centered beneath the gable peak on the second floor. Elsewhere, 1/1 units are asymmetrically place on walls in order to accommodate internal room usage and staircases.

A detached frame double-bay garage is located at the rear of the property west of the house. It has a broad, low-pitched front gable roof and a single overhead door. It is clad in clapboard-style vinyl siding. The building was constructed in 2003 according to Assessor records

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8. Significance

The Krause House at 519 2nd St NW built in 1900 is an example of a vernacular Side-Gable, 2-story house form popular from the 1860s to the turn of the 20th century known as a "Center-Gable House." The house qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as a contributing resource to the historic district under Criterion C. The garage is considered noncontributing because of its recent construction.

It is likely that the Krause House is the second dwelling erected on this parcel. Property transfer records show Lots 1 and 2 in Block 3 of the J.J. Smith Addition was first acquired by Christian Haas in 1892 from Moritz Koeberle. The 1885 lowa Census shows the Koeberle family residing on this property but because certain design elements found in the current building are from the late 1890s or early 1900s, it is likely the Koeberle home was not the current Center Gable house. Christian Haas bought the property in 1892 and held it until 1899. The 1899 city directory lists Gustave Haas, a single man, residing at an Elm Street address that could be this property. A construction date of ca. 1897 could be possible with the house's granite hard head foundation and its leaded glass cottage windows, both of which appeared in other 1890s houses in Waverly.

However, news accounts clearly date the house's construction to 1900. The property passed briefly to real estate dealer C.H. Mether in 1899 and then to Minnie Krause and her husband Charles. On March 29, 1900, the *Bremer County Independent* notes that "Charles Crouse [sic] has the cellar dug and rock ready for the masons for his nice ne house which will be erected on the lot lately purchased of C.H. Methe in the Second ward." On June 14, 1900, the *Waverly Republican* stated that C.F. Krouse [sic] had begun the carpentry work on his new residence. The December 27, 1900 issue of the *Bremer County Independent* lists the Charles Krouse [sic] House completed earlier in the year for a value of \$2,000 as part of the year end summary of local construction.

In 1905 the property was sold to George Hertlein and his wife Marie (Mary). After George's death, Marie sold the house in 1912 to W.G. Carstensen. He and his wife, Carrie, resided here according to the 1912 city directory with Carstensen owning a farm implement and car dealership at 301 E Bremer Avenue that he opened in 1912. Four years later he sold the house back to Marie Hertlein who held it until 1921 when she sold it to Henry Bergman.

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
