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### 7. Description

This single-family house is estimated to have been built in 1893 according to Bremer County Assessor records. The house form and style are consistent with similar houses in Waverly built using this form from ca. 1890 to 1910. Property Transfer Records show this property held by Henry Barthing in the 1890s but he did not reside at this address in 1899. That year he sold the parcel to Earl Dickinson, a real estate dealer. A March 29, 1900 account in the *Bremer County Independent* notes that "Earl Dickinson has the rock hauled for the foundation of a neat Cottage to e erected on his lots in the Second ward." By year's end, the house and barn (nonextant) built by Dickinson was listed as costing \$2,400 in the December 27, 1900 issue of *Bremer County Independent*. In 1913, the Waverly city directory shows Earl and his wife, Nina, residing at 522 N Elm (2<sup>nd</sup> St NW). A construction date of 1900 is confirmed for this house.

This house is an example of a vernacular Hipped Roof, 1-story house form. The house has a rock foundation and the walls are clad in medium-width steel clapboard-style siding. The house has a moderate pitched hipped roof with narrow eaves and broad gabled attic dormers on the south and north roof slopes centered along the edge. A shed roofed porch spans the front façade with a low-pitched pediment above the centered entrance steps. It has four full-height square columns across the front and closely spaced square spindles in the balustrades. The porch skirting retains its original patternwork consisting of closely spaced vertical lath.

Fenestration for the house includes a mix of 1/1 double-hung window sizes. The dormers have small 1/1 double-hung units and the side facades have tall and narrow 1/1 double-hung windows in singles and pairs. The windows on original front façade beneath the porch roof include a large 2/2 unit to the right of the entrance and a narrow 1/1 unit to the left.

The house has a 1-story frame garage/barn constructed at the rear along the north-south alley, most likely the building referred to in the 1900 year-end construction summary. The garage has board-and-batten wood siding and corner board trim. It has a moderate-pitched front-gable roof with narrow eaves and a hay door in north gable peak. Square six-light windows and a passage door are located on the west façade. The roof ridge is parallel to the alley and the by-pass doors on the north end have been replaced by a slightly smaller overhead door and tongue-and-groove board infill surrounding it.

Alterations: Steel siding, undated; overhead garage door, undated.

### 8. Significance

The Earl and Nina Dickinson House at 522 2nd St NW was built in 1900 and is an example of a vernacular Hipped Roof, 1-story house form. Dickinson was part of a real estate dealership that handled properties in the 1890s and early 1900s in Waverly and Bremer County and this appears to be his first personal residence built in a neighborhood where he sold and listed many vacant lots and existing houses at the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. The house qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as a contributing resource to the historic district under Criteria A and C.

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Earl Dickinson and his wife Nina purchased this property in 1899 from Henry Barthing. The couple moved in the following year after building a house and barn valued at \$2,400. Earl was employed in real estate sales with his father, John Dickinson, in 1900 and by 1903 Earl sold real estate on his own. He eventually added insurance sales to the business. While in real estate, Earl's firm was headquartered at the "Stone Corner" in downtown and was especially involved in sales in the Harmon and LeValley Addition and J.J. Smith Addition. By 1913, Earl Dickinson's real estate company was one of eight such firms in Waverly – an indication of the real estate boom before WW I.

In 1914, the Dickinsons sold their house to Christian and Rachel Brinkmann. Christian died in 1920 but Rachel continued to reside here according to telephone book listings until at least 1926. In 1928 the property was transferred to Fred Kappmeyer and his wife Mary.




