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7. Description

This single-family house is estimated to have been built in 1917 according to Bremer County Assessor records. The house form and style are consistent with houses in Waverly built from the 1910s through the 1920s. The property was transferred from Albert Bruns, Sr. to Henry and Jessie Kohagen in July 1916. No house is shown at this address in the 1913 city directory. *Bremer County Independent* news accounts on 8/10/1916 and 8/31/1916 discussed Kohagan building a house in the 2nd Ward. Given this information it is likely that the house was completed the following year in ca. 1917. The concrete block products and design found in the porch suggest the material was manufactured and installed by George Blain & Co., a cement products company that was located in northwest Waverly and has been documented building similar porches in the Harmon & LeValley Addition.

This frame house is an example of a vernacular 2-story Hipped Roof form known as the "American Four-Square" that became popular before WW I across the country and in Waverly. This example has a rock-faced concrete block foundation with narrow wood clapboard-style vinyl siding and wide corner board trim. The house has a low-pitched flared hipped roof with wide eaves and hipped roof attic dormers centered on the west and front slopes. The front porch has a broad front-gabled roof and its width spans the front façade. The tympanum is finished with unpainted stucco and painted cross-timbering.

The porch retains its original open design with full size 8-inch block for the foundation and entrance steps balustrades, a concrete deck, and a 4-inch block balustrade. Four 8-inch block pedestals are evenly spaced across the front with tapered concrete pillars serving as roof supports. The concrete entrance steps are set in the south end in order to provide a larger seating area in the balance of the porch. The concrete block products and design found in the porch suggest the material was manufactured and installed by George Blain & Co., a cement products company that was located in northwest Waverly and has been documented building similar porches in the Harmon & LeValley Addition. A nearly identical porch is found at 323 5th St NW.

Fenestration includes feature windows on the front façade's lower level and a mix of single and paired 1/1 doublehung units, widely spaced elsewhere. The front façade's first floor has cottage windows flanking the centered entrance. The matching cottage windows have large square single lights topped by wide horizontal upper sash containing geometric patterned leaded glass designs. The entrance opening has a beveled glass door with rectangular lights in a geometric pattern and beveled glass sidelights on each side. An entrance on the south façade accesses the main level and the basement stairs. The dormers have pairs of small 1/1 windows.

A large detached side-gabled double-bay garage likely is located west of the house and opens onto 4th Ave NW along the west edge of the property. It has a low-pitched front-gable roof with narrow clapboard-style vinyl siding. According to Assessor records it was built in 1998.

8. Significance

The Henry and Jessie Kohagen House at 421 4th St NW was built in 1917 and is an example vernacular 2-story Hipped Roof house form referred to as an American Four-Square house. It became popular in Waverly before and after World War I. A number of similar houses were built in the same neighborhood during the 1910s and 1920s. This particular example has masonry work attributed to George Blain & Co., a cement products company located in northwest Waverly. The house qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places individually and as a contributing resource to the historic district under Criteria A and C. The garage is considered noncontributing.

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According to property transfer records, the parcel was transferred from Albert Bruns, Sr. to Henry and Jessie Kohagen in July 1916. No house is shown at this address in the 1913 city directory but an earlier building may have been on this site listed as 423 Locust St (4th St NW). *Bremer County Independent* news accounts on 8/10/1916 and 8/31/1916 (both at right) discuss Kohagan building a house in the 2nd Ward. Albert Bruns has been identified as a land developer for other lots in the neighborhood. The concrete block products and design found in the porch suggest the material was manufactured and constructed by George Blain & Co., a cement products company that was located in northwest Waverly and has been documented building similar foundations and porches in the Harmon & LeValley Addition.

The Kohagens resided at this address until Henry's death in 1945. The house passed to Vera Kohagen at that time and was resold after Jessie Kohagen's death in 1948 to

August 10, 1916

-Henry Kohagen has purchased a lot of Albert Bruns in the Second ward and will erect thereon a fine new modern house. This would indicate that Henry is going to move to town and we know he will meet with a warm reception, as he is made of that stuff that makes a good neighbor.

August 31, 1916

-H. A. Kohagen on Monday started the work on the foundation of the new house he is building in the Second ward. He hopes to have it completed this fall.

Arthur and Lydia Epley. Arthur was a retired farmer and the couple resided here into the 1960s. In 19753, their respective estates transferred the property to Milton Epley who with other family members transferred the house to Marilyn McNamara in 1983.
