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7. Description

This single-family house is estimated to have been built in 1914 according to Bremer County Assessor records. The house form and style are consistent with houses in Waverly built during the years leading up to World War I. No house at this address appears in the 1913 city directory listings. Property transfer records show this lot passed from Ida Lutz to Martin Ellison in September 1915 when it is believed there was no house on the site. Ellison held the property until September 1917 when it was purchased by Louisa Mundfrom. Based on the design of the house and those of other similar local house designs, it is believed this house was built sometime during the ownership of Ellison or Mundfrom. A construction date of ca. 1916 appears to be more accurate.

This 1½-story frame house occupies a prominent corner lot and is an example of a well-preserved Bungalow/Craftsman Style dwelling from the pre-World War I period. The house has a concrete block foundation (not visible) with a combination of square-cut wood shingle on the lower section of the walls, flaring out over the foundation and extending to ground level. The mid-wall section has narrow clapboard siding. A wide belt course or story board separates the clapboard band from the stucco filling the upper wall and gable ends; rectilinear half-timbering is in each of the gables. A moderatepitched front-gabled roof has shed-roof dormers on the north and south slopes with plain stucco on their walls. On the front façade, a contiguous front-gabled porch wraps the north corner and a frontgabled oriel window wraps the south corner. The house has wide width eaves that are lined with kneebrackets at purlin points of the main gables; exposed rafters are along the north side and on the sloped edges of the porch and oriel gable. The front porch takes up about one-third of the front facade and was originally open above the closed, shingle-clad balustrade. Now these walls are enclosed with pairs of 1/1 windows above the balustrade. Short piers rest on tall shingle-clad pedestals at the outer corners. A course of widely spaced dentils lines the porch's cornice.

Fenestration includes a range of window designs in various sizes positioned to meet the needs of the interior spaces. For example, three small 1/1 double-hung windows are grouped in each of the wide dormer spaces to provide ample lighting. Craftsman Style double-hung variations include the large 6/1 windows (vertical lights in the upper sashes) in the oriel windows on the southwest corner and a group of four tall and narrow 4/1 windows in the rectilinear bay on the south façade. On the front façade, a pair of sashes with four vertical lights is in the gable peak. On the north façade, a pair of 4/1 windows is centered beneath the dormer and horizontal windows with vertical lights provide light for the basement.

The house has a detached double-bay frame garage opening to the south. It was completed in 1968 according to Assessor records and has a low pitched front-gabled roof, narrow clapboard siding, and tongue-and-grooved siding in the gable peaks.

Alterations: porch enclosure (undated); garage (1968).

8. Significance

The Ellison-Mundfrom House at 422 5th St NW was built in ca. 1916 and is an example of wellpreserved Bungalow/Craftsman Style dwelling from the pre-World War I period. It is typical of several

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other houses built as this section of the Harmon and LeValley Addition developed before the war and may have been designed by John F. Leitha, architectural designer who resided two blocks to the south on 5th St NW. The house qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as a contributing resource to the historic district under Criteria A and C. The garage is considered noncontributing.

Property transfer records show Lot 4 passed from Ida Lutz to Martin Ellison in September 1915 and two years later it was purchased by Louisa Mundfrom. The 1913 city directory shows now house at this address at that time but it is believed the house was erected sometime between 1915 and 1917. In 1922, the house passed to William Kehle and a short time later to Emil Rausch, a minister. In 1934 the house passed to Ernest Muller and 1945 it transferred to Ernst and Marie Mueller.




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
