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Ruddick, Judge George W. and Estella, House	Bremer
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7. Description

This 2-story single-family house is estimated to have been built in 1900 according to Bremer County Assessor records. Property transfer records show the property acquired by G.W. Ruddick in April 1886 when he purchased the south half of Lots 5 and 6 in Block 17 of the Original Town from Lina Herman and her husband. Newspaper accounts from January through September 1892 reference Ruddick's construction of a house in the 4th Ward including one on January 5, 1892 showing the house to be valued at \$3,000.

This frame house is an example of a Queen Anne Style Gabled Roof, 2-story house form referred to as Spindlework sub-type. It has a broad front-gable roof on the main block with a pent-gable peak and two shallow, hipped roof 2-story projecting wings set midway along the north and south facades. A 1-story hipped roof enclosed porch is located on the north façade. The moderate-pitched front gable extends on the south slope over the 2-story entrance area and stairs. The Ruddick House has a parged concrete block foundation with narrow-width wood clapboard for the first and second levels and covecut wood shingles in the gable peaks and for the attic dormer walls. The front gable also has sunburst quarter panels to either side of the windows. The house has a mix of narrow and wide eaves and a belt separating floors. A moderate-pitched hipped roof entrance porch is tucked on the left side of the front façade projecting slightly from the front wall. The narrow eaves are lined by small brackets and originally had heavy turned posts, a spindled frieze and geometric patterned balustrade. The current porch elements include turned roof supports with a balustrade consisting of slender turned replacement spindles. The geometric pattern of the original skirting has been replaced with solid channel-cut panels.

The front door has a multi-light storm door and has a short and wide double-hung window with small square lights surrounding a larger light in the upper sash to the left. The door is opposite the wide entrance steps. Fenestration includes large cottage windows on the front façade with single lights in the upper sash. A group of three stair-step windows with square lights in the upper and lower boarders appear along the stairs on the south façade. Elsewhere single and paired double-hung windows have short upper sash. Decorative sash include a pair of multi-light leaded light sash in the front gable peak set beneath a bracketed overhang and horizontal sash with a perimeter of square lights in the attic dormers and in the front wall above the hipped porch. The projecting bays on the north and south sides have angled bay window groups. The north enclosed porch has a continuous row of 1/1 double-hung windows.

The house has a detached1-story hipped-roof garage located southwest of the main building. Built in 1923 according to Bremer County Assessor records, it is clad in narrow wood clapboard siding and narrow corner board trim with multi-light windows extending along the side walls. The entrance bay opens to the south

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8. Significance

The Ruddick House is an example of an1890s-era Queen Anne Style house form with Spindlework detailing and a 2-story, Gabled Roof form. The house was part of the main wave of homebuilding in the neighborhood that extended from the 1880s through World War I. Its owners, Judge George Ruddick and his wife Estella, built the house in 1892. The house qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places individually under Criterion C and the garage is a contributing resource.

George W. Ruddick immigrated to lowa from New York state in 1856. He opened a law office in a small building near the bridge along East Bremer Avenue. His courtroom appearances became legendary and in 1857 he was elected prosecuting attorney for Bremer County. In 1859 he married Estella Strictland; the couple had two sons, Julian and B.S. Ruddick. Later terms in office included representative in the Iowa General Assembly in 1860-1861 and positions as county judge, circuit judge and district judge for the 12th District. He served in the latter position for more than two decades retiring in 1892, the same year that George and Estella's house was completed. George resumed the practice of law upon retirement from the 12th District. On December 12, 1905 Judge Ruddick died at home having lived his entire adult life in Waverly. A brief biography from Gue's *History of Iowa* appears below:

GEORGE W. RUDDICK was born in Thompson, Sullivan County, New York, May 11, 1835. He worked on his father's farm until fourteen, when he spent two years at an academy in Kingsville, Ohio, supplementing this with a similar course of instruction at Monticello, New York. At eighteen he began the study of law graduating from the Albany Law School in 1856. He then came to Iowa, locating at Waverly which became his permanent home. In 1857 Mr. Ruddick was elected Prosecuting Attorney for Bremer County, holding the office until the adoption of the new Constitution. In 1859 he was elected Representative in the House of the Eighth General Assembly for the district composed of the counties of Chickasaw and Bremer, serving in the regular session of 1860 and the war session of 1861. He was elected county judge in 1862, serving two years; in 1867 he was elected circuit judge and two years later was chosen District Judge of the Twelfth District, serving from 1870 to 1892. At one time he received strong support for Judge of the Supreme Court, as he always ranked high as a jurist.
