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### 7. Description

This 2-story single-family house is estimated to have been built in 1911 according to Bremer County Assessor records. The design for the house is consistent with this date. Property transfer records show the property acquired by H.E.Moehling in June 1908 and newspaper accounts in 1910 and 1911 describe its construction "H.E. Moehling has a force of men at work putting in the foundation walls for his new residence in the 4<sup>th</sup> ward." The 1913 city directory lists the Moehling family as residing at 322 2<sup>nd</sup> Ave. SE suggesting the house was completed before then.

The Moehling House is an example of a Craftsman Style house built in the Bungalow or Bungalow Cottage Form. This well-preserved example incorporates Craftsman Style cladding, dormer and eave treatments, and fenestration. It has a broad, moderate-pitched side-gabled roof on the main block with a large low-pitched gabled attic dormer on the front slope. Knee-brace brackets are positioned evenly along the deep eaves of the gabled ends and exposed rafters line the sloped edges.

The Moehling House has a rock-faced concrete block foundation with the walls clad in square-cut shingles that flare at the water table. Additional wall finishes include vertical half-timbering in the gable peaks of the front dormer and porch gable. The front façade has a balanced, asymmetrical composition with a porch located on the center bay opposite the entrance and extending to the east. A flat roof lined by wide eaves and exposed rafters is over the east end and a low-pitched, broad gable roof is over the entrance section. The porch gable is also lined with decorative rafter tails and knee-brace brackets that complement the half-timbering on the shingles. Three battered shingle-clad pedestals are positioned across the front edge of the porch. Their flared cladding extends to ground level and they are topped by short battered piers. Geometric brackets connect to the brackets along the architrave. The balustrade is composed of narrowly spaced square spindles and a similar design is used for the porch skirting panels. The shingle cladding is used for a closed balustrade to either side of the entrance steps, also flared slightly at the bases to match the pedestals and the walls of the main house. Together, the porch design is a classic Craftsman Style combination of proportion and elements.

Fenestration includes a variety of Craftsman window types. On the east and west facades, 4/1 double-hung windows with vertical lights in the upper sashes predominate. On the front a group of short 8/1 double-hungs are in the attic dormer. To either side of the entrance, matching horizontal sash with geometric pattern work are recessed in a shallow alcove flanking the door. A pair of 12-light French doors opens on the east end of the porch and a 4/1 double-hung is to the immediate right of the porch. A dramatic feature window group is positioned at the northwest corner of the first floor. A shallow, low-pitched hipped roof lined in decorative rafter tails wraps the projecting corner with a pair of closely spaced vertical sash facing north and west. Each window has geometric patterned lights similar to those flanking the entrance. Elsewhere windows are of varied sizes and positioned to meet the needs of the interior spaces.

The house has a double-bay frame garage opening onto the alley. It was completed in 1953 according to Assessor records and has a broad gable roof and vertical board siding.

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### 8. Significance

The Moehling House is an example of a well-executed and preserved Craftsman Style house built in the Bungalow or Bungalow Cottage Form. The house was part of the main wave of homebuilding in the neighborhood that extended from the 1880s through World War I. Its owners, H.E. and Prudence Moehling, built the house in ca. 1911. The house qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as an individually eligible building as well as a contributing resource under Criterion C and the garage is considered noncontributing.

Herman E. Moehling purchased Lots 1 and 2 in Block 15 from N.E. Pierce in 1908, three years after he and his wife, Prudence (Brassington) were married. Moehling was born in Bremer County and after working with his father in the mercantile business in Tripoli, moved to Waverly and accepted the position of deputy county treasurer. He later was elected Bremer County Treasurer and held the office for two years before becoming assistant cashier for the State Bank of Waverly in 1908. He held that position until 1936. Prudence Moehling converted the house to two apartments following her husband's death and continued to own the house until 1953. An obituary for Herman E. Moehling taken from an unidentified Waverly newspaper appears below:

MOEHLING, Herman Ernest (1876 - 1939)

May 20, 1876 - August 28, 1939

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H. E. MOEHLING, 63, for more than thirty years active in civic and business affairs of Waverly, died Monday after an illness extending over three years. He had been confined to his bed for seven months. His funeral will be Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the Kaiser funeral home with the Rev. Arthur R. Rice of Parkersburg officiating. Burial will be in Harlington Cemetery, where the local Masonic order will have charge of the services.

Casket bearers will be C. C. Runyard, F. H. Keseberg, H. C. Gruben, Dr. J. D. Hemingway, F. A. Mills and L. C. Osincup.

Herman MOEHLING, the oldest of three children, was born on a farm near Tripoli, Iowa, on May 20, 1876, son of C. H. and Sophia MOEHLING. At the age of five he moved with his parents to Tripoli, where received his elementary and high school education.

As a child he became affiliated with the Evangelical church, of which he was a member until his death. After his college work at Waterloo, he was associated with his father in the general mercantile business at Tripoli. In 1903 he came to Waverly, where he was deputy county treasurer for two years and later was elected county treasurer for two years.

From 1908 up to three years ago he served as assistant cashier of the State Bank of Waverly. He resigned form this position in September, 1936, because of ill health.

Mr. MOEHLING was united in marriage with Prudence BRASSINGTON of Madison, Wis., on Nov. 1, 1905.

Surviving are the widow, four daughters: Mrs. W. R. HOLMES of Waverly, Mrs. M. J. HILLMAN, Wellington, Texas: Mrs. R. C. HERRMANN, Chicago, Ill.; and Mrs. J. V. STOUT of Waterloo, Ia.; four grandchildren, Arden and Eugene HOLMES, Judith HERRMANN and Kay STOUT, and one sister, Mrs.

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

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
