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

Brotherton, Josephine, House	Bremer
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7. Description

This 2-story single-family house is estimated to have been built in 1910 according to Bremer County Assessor records. Property transfer records show the property acquired by "J. Brotherton" – either James Brotherton or his wife Josephine Brotherton in 1872 from Lucy Johnson and her husband. The 1885 census shows Josephine and her three daughters residing on Lot 1 in Fractional Block 7 in an earlier house. By 1899 the city directory shows Josephine and her children residing on 3rd Street SE most likely while the new house several blocks away was under construction. Newspaper accounts from February 1899 through December 1900 reference Mrs. Brotherton building a house in the 4th Ward, presumably the one on 2nd Street SE. In the 1913 city directory, Mrs. Josephine and her daughters resided at this address. Together, this information confirms a likely construction date of 1899-1900 rather than 1910.

This 2-story frame house is an example of a vernacular Front-Gable Roof form similar to the "Suburban Cottage" in the vernacular typology developed by Jan Jennings and Herbert Gottfried in *American Vernacular Design*. It has a moderate pitched front-gable roof with a closed gable on the front façade, and a hipped roof on the rear main block and rear addition. A historic photo from 1939 for the house at 410 2nd St. SE shows a small hipped attic dormer along the south slope. This was later removed. The house



has a 2-story porch inset on the southeast corner and a 1-story flat-roofed porch filling the ell on the northeast corner. Only the latter porch appears on the 1927 Sanborn Map (right). There is no doubt that the southeast 2-story was an original design feature.

The Brotherton House has a stone block foundation with medium-width clapboard-style aluminum siding for all wall surfaces. The 2-story porch or gallery has a massive, square paneled column at the outer corner. Turned spindles are located along the south side of the first floor and due their taller height appear to be replacements. On the upper level, shorter turned spindles with curved ends on the handrail match the balustrade elements on the 1-story porch confirming they are original. The upper level of the porch has a door on the west wall with a square, single-light sash in the upper half. The 1-story porch has clusters of three smooth columns at the outer corners of the north side. Porch steps lead to the west and the entrance door is on the west wall. The porch skirting has been modified with the installation of solid aluminum panels.

Fenestration includes mostly tall and narrow single and paired 1/1 double-hung windows. On the front façade facing 2nd Street, a cottage window was originally installed on the first floor. It has been modified with the removal of the decorative horizontal sash but the proportion of the window openings remains. On the second floor a pair of sash is centered over the cottage window opening. Elsewhere the windows are widely spaced with a few smaller units defining other uses in the house.

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The free standing garage has a double-wide front-gable garage with matching aluminum siding. According to Assessor records it was constructed in 1975. It has a single double-wide overhead garage door.

Alterations: siding, porch element changes, and window changes (undated, likely post-1960); dormer (post-1939).

8. Significance

The Brotherton House is an example of a turn-of-the-20th century Front-Gable House or Suburban Cottage. The house was part of the main wave of homebuilding in the neighborhood that extended from the 1880s through World War I. Its owner, Josephine Brotherton had the house built in 1899-1900. The house qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places under Criteria A and C as a contributing resource in the historic district. The garage is considered noncontributing.

In 1872 Lot 1 in Fractional Block 7 of the Original Town was acquired by "J. Brotherton" – either James Brotherton or his wife Josephine Brotherton from Lucy Johnson and her husband. In 1879, James died. By 1885, Iowa Census records show Josephine and three daughters residing at the house listed on this property. Cora, May (Mae) and Allie (Alice) were listed as 13, 11 and 9 years old, respectively. By 1895, the Iowa Census records show Josephine still residing here with her daughters, all unmarried. By 1899 when newspaper accounts show Josephine building a new house in the 4th Ward, the Brotherton family had moved to a nearby house in the 300 block of 3rd Street SE. Both Mae and Cora were working as teachers according to the 1899 city directory. The next record of the family in the 1913 city directory shows Josephine with Mae and Cora still residing here. Alice had married Dr. Charles G. Farnum and relocated to Peoria, Illinois. Josephine died in 1923, Mae in 1951 and Cora in 1958. All are buried in Harlington Cemetery in Waverly. Alice died in 1952 in Peoria.
