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

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#### 7. Description

This single-family house is estimated to have been built in 1920 according to Bremer County Assessor records. Property transfer records show the property acquired by S.H. Morse in 1869 from William Wright and his wife. The 1885 census shows the Morse family residing on Lot 3 in Fractional Block 7, two houses away. By June 1893, a newspaper reports that the house was present and being remodeled. A more recent newspaper report suggests the date of construction was 1888. The 1899 and 1913 city directories both show the Morse family in residence. Together, this information confirms a likely construction date of ca. 1890 rather than 1920.

This 2-story frame house is an example of a vernacular Gable-Front-and-Wing form with Queen Anne decoration. It has a moderate-to-steeply pitched intersecting gable roof on the main block and gable roofs on two rear additions. The main house two gabled wall dormers on the front slope of the right-hand ell and a hipped roof wall dormer on the north slope of the front-gable wing. Because of the way the two wings join, the north gable end forms a triangle where it rises above the ridge of the east-west wing. As the house appeared in 1896, a shed-roofed porch filled the right-hand ell with a second level

walk-out balcony near the inner corner. Its roof was formed by an extension of what is now a gabled wall dormer. On the first level of the original porch, a pediment appeared over the porch entrance steps in front of this balcony. After the porch was cut down to its current size (date unknown), the balcony was removed and the gable roof extension cut back to the wall dormer present today. The pediment was likely removed at the same time. The outline for the original porch appears on the 1927 Sanborn Map (right).



The Morse House according to newspaper accounts from 1893 has gone through several changes. It has a stone block foundation likely put in place when the foundation was raised and its walls are covered with medium-width clapboard-style vinyl siding. Decorative shingles are retained for the gable ends and shingles or molding designs are used for the gable dormers. The large west and south gable ends have a combination of cove-cut and diamond-cut shingles laid in horizontal bands. The right front wall dormer has diamond-cut shingles above the window and small fan motifs at the lower corners of the gable. The left front wall dormer was originally a projecting gable roof for a small porch roof balcony. That balcony was removed sometime prior to 1990 with the gable fan molding pattern reset in the wall dormer opening. It is likely that this was the same time that the shed roof porch that filled the ell was reduced in size. A low shed roof was retained and the enclosed walls clad in matching vinyl siding.

Fenestration includes mostly original double-hung windows and a few replacement units. Tall and narrow 1/1 double-hung windows seen in an 1896 view of the house are evenly spaced on the north wing. The upper level window on the front gable end has a perimeter of square lights. A pair of tall casements has replaced an original window tucked in the balcony wall of the front gable wing. After the porch balcony was removed, the balcony door was replaced with a small 1/1 sash in the left wall

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dormer. A 3/1 double-hung sash replaced a 1/1 unit seen in an 1896 view of the house. On the south façade, an original angular bay window was replaced by a rectilinear bay with tall and narrow 4/4 sash including a pair in the south face. Windows elsewhere include a mix of double-hung sash, a semicircular fixed sash in the south gable end, and at least one horizontal awning window in the north wall of a rear addition.

The free standing garage has a double-wide front-gable with wide wood clapboard siding on the walls and channel-cut siding in the gable end. According to Assessor records it was constructed in 1992. It has a single double-wide overhead garage door.

Alterations: siding, porch element changes, and window changes (undated, likely post-1960); garage (1992).

#### 8. Significance

The Morse House is an example of a vernacular Gable-Front-and-Wing form built in ca. 1890 that retains some of its Queen Anne finishes and decorative elements. The house was part of the main wave of homebuilding in the neighborhood that extended from the 1880s through World War I. Its owners, Stephen H. Morse and his wife Lidie, had the house built and remodeled during Stephen's tenure as a county official, abstractor and insurance agent. The house qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places under Criteria A and C as a contributing resource in the historic district. The garage is considered noncontributing.

In 1869 Lot 5 in Fractional Block 8 of the Original Town was acquired by Stephen H. Morse. During his career Stephen was first employed as an apprentice at the Sidney H. Curtis & Sons hardware business. He later worked at the Bremer County Court House in several positions – perhaps spurred on by his former employer, S.H. Curtis who chaired the Board of Supervisors in 1873. Morse was deputy treasurer, recorder and eventually elected county auditor. He also continued his abstracting and insurance business, Morse & Munger Abstract Co. at 306 E. Bremer Avenue. He died in 1914 passing the business to his son-in-law Frank Munger, husband of his daughter Grace. Lidie held the house for five years after his death selling it to Henry G. Schell and his wife Mabel in 1919. Henry operated Schell's Grocery Store at 223 W. Bremer Avenue.


