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

#### 7. Description

This 2-story single-family house is estimated to have been built in 1925 according to Bremer County Assessor records. Property transfer records show the property acquired by Edward L. Smalley in March 1877 from Mary Leonard and her husband. Newspaper accounts from May 1891 through September 1892 reference Smalley's construction of a house on State Street (2<sup>nd</sup> Street) in the 4<sup>th</sup> Ward. The house shares a design similar to the Ruddick House just a block away at 321 1<sup>st</sup> Street SE.

This frame house is an example of a Queen Anne Style Gabled Roof, 2-story house form referred to as "Spindlework" sub-type because of the presence of spindles in the detailing or also the "Eastlake Style". It has a broad front-gable roof on the main block with a pent-gable peak and two shallow, gable roofed, 2-story projecting wings set midway along the north and south facades. The moderate-pitched front gable has an overhang in the peak and the south roof slope extends over the balcony located above the wraparound porch entrance area. The Smalley House has an uncommon foundation material described in a news account on September 19, 1891 in the *Waverly Republican* as "hardheads" [sic]. These random-sized blocks of granite were found frequently in "boulder belts" of Wisconsin, strewn over dune areas and retrieved for ornamental use hardhead foundations and fireplaces.

The Smalley House has narrow-width wood clapboard for cladding on the first and second levels separated by horizontal stickwork and a clapboard band between levels. Corner board trim ties into the window trim boards and the belt course band typical of Eastlake designs. Cove-cut wood shingles are used in combination with clapboard for the gable peaks. The house has a mix of narrow and wide eaves and returning cornices are found on the gables of the side



wings. A low-pitched hipped roof entrance porch wraps southeast corner with low pediments over the front steps and along the south side. The tympanum in each pediment has molded fans, diamonds and other patternwork. The narrow porch eaves are lined by small brackets with cut-work designs. The turned porch posts and elaborate spindlework in the balustrade are original elements. The geometric pattern of the original skirting panels has also been retained. The upper level balcony above the porch entrance area has circular framed opening on the front with spindled inserts at the upper corners and a row of square spindles in the short balustrade across the front. The house's front door has a multipaneled lower half and the window in the upper half has a perimeter of square lights. This pattern is repeated in the south porch entrance door as well.

Fenestration includes a cottage window on the front façade with single lights in the lower and horizontal upper sash. Elsewhere, single and paired double-hung windows have short upper sash. Decorative sash include multi-light horizontal sash in the north and south gable peaks (a long horizontal light topped by a double row of square lights). The front gable has a pair of double-hung windows with the upper sash containing a row of stained glass square lights along the upper and outer edges. The use of stained glass square lights is repeated in a feature window on the south side of the porch adjacent to the entrance door. The window here has a tall and narrow shape allowing the stained glass lights to

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catch the south light on this side of the porch. The south wing has angled walls providing each level of this wing with angled bay window groups.

The house has a detached1-story hipped-roof garage located southwest of the main building. Built in 1930 according to Bremer County Assessor records, it is clad in narrow wood clapboard siding and appears to have been enlarged to its current rectangular, multi-bay size. The entrance bays open to the east . A deck extends along the rear of the house with an elaborate pergola at the sound end. Both are not original.

Alterations: deck and pergola, (undated).

#### 8. Significance

The Smalley House is a well-preserved example of a Queen Anne Style Gabled Roof, 2-story house form referred to as the "Spindlework" sub-type or "Eastlake Style." The house was part of the main wave of homebuilding in the neighborhood that extended from the 1880s through World War I. Its owners, Edward L. Smalley and his wife Louisa, built the house in 1891-1892. The house qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places individually under Criterion C and as a contributing resource in the historic district. The garage is a noncontributing resource.

Edward L. Smalley acquired this property in 1877, four years after he married Louisa Gasaway. Smalley was an attorney in Waverly and grew to have a large practice in Bremer and surrounding counties. In 1891, the Smalleys decided to place a house on the lot they had held for 20 years. In 1896, their new home was described in the *Semi Centennial Souvenir of Waverly* thusly –

"The beautiful residence which we re-produce on this page from a photograph, was recently built by Mr. Smalley, and is a model for convenience and comfort. It partakes somewhat of the Queen Ann [sic] style of architecture, and is built on pleasing lines throughout. The interior is finished in southern hard woods, and the decorations, furniture and draperies are of the latest pattern and design artistically and tastily arranged. The house is fitted with all modern conveniences throughout."

A brief biography of Edward Smalley below was prepared in 1883, a few years before the house was built.

"E. L. SMALLEY is also among the prominent members of the Bar of Bremer County. He was born in Muncy, Lycoming County, Penn., January 23rd, 1847, a son of John SMALLEY, a Presbyterian minister, who for many years filled the pulpit for that denomination and was proprietor and principal of the Muncy Female Seminary. In 1855 the family removed to Butler County, Pa, and two years later they came to Bremer County, IA, locating at Waverly, where Mr. SMALLEY, senior, was instrumental in raising funds for the erection of the Presbyterian church of Waverly, filling t pulpit there for ten years. In 1865 he purchased a farm in Warren Township, where he removed and remained until his

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death, which occurred in 1879. He was a man of culture, broad intellect, and much esteemed by all who knew him. He was a republican in politics, and for a number of years represented his township in the county board.

The subject of this sketch was educated in the Muncy and at Weatherspoon Institutes. In 1869 and 1870, he attended Hanover College at Hanover, Ind., in the meantime reading law, and on Nov. 17th, 1874, was admitted to the Bar. In 1871 he married Miss Louisa GASAWAY, of Madison, Jefferson County, Ind. Mr. and Mrs. SMALLEY are members of the Methodist Church. Mr. SMALLEY does abstract real estate and a law business. He is a successful lawyer, well-read, a good orator and a hard worker." (*History of Bremer County*, 1883, p. 865; available online at: http://iagenweb.org/boards/bremer/biographies/index.cgi?review=145977; accessed 2/18/2012)

Edward Smalley died in 1910 and Louisa in 1918. Both are buried in Harlington Cemetery in Waverly.






