
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#### 7. Description

This 2-story single-family house is estimated to have been built in 1894 according to Bremer County Assessor records. The 1913 city directory lists the house at this address occupied by M.M. Kingsley and his wife Ethel. The 1927 Sanborn Map shows the building in place. The presence of a stone foundation suggests a pre-1900 construction date.

This frame house is an example of a vernacular Hipped Roof, 2story house form, a forerunner of the post-1900 house form known as the "American Four-Square. It has a low-pitched hipped-roof with a flat-roofed porch spanning the full front façade. The house has a stone foundation, some sections with a parged finish, and narrow-width clapboard-style vinyl siding on the walls. A small, flatroofed enclosed rear porch appears on the 1927 Sanborn Map (right) and is likely original to the house. The front porch appears to be a replacement constructed sometime after ca. 1910 when concrete block were introduced locally. The porch has three tall concrete block pedestals across the front with battered piers resting



on each, serving as roof supports. The low balustrade has closely spaced turned spindles. Two turned porch posts attached to the walls are outfitted with spindled brackets. They may be remnants of the original porch. The current porch has a wide set of steps opposite the entrance on the left side. The porch skirting panels have narrowly spaced vertical lattice.

Fenestration includes feature windows with Classical designs such as the cottage window to the right of the entrance. It has an upper sash with geometric patterned lights typical of turn-of-the-20<sup>th</sup> century Classical Revival houses and institutional buildings. Similar patterned lights are found in the upper sashes of the double-hung windows along the south façade facing 4<sup>th</sup> Avenue SE. Another window with a similar Classical design is the horizontal window on the north façade. Windows are widely spaced throughout the house.

The house has a detached garage located at the northeast corner of the parcel with narrow paved strips connecting it to 2<sup>nd</sup> Street. The single-bay front-gable building has narrow vertical siding (likely tongue-and-groove) and a concrete foundation. It is located on the same site as the property's concrete block garage shown in the 1927 Sanborn Map (above). The present garage was constructed in 1945 according to Assessor records.

Alterations: conversion to duplex (undated); front porch changes (post-1910); rear porch enclosed (2005); garage (ca. 1945) and vinyl siding (1993).

#### 8. Significance

The Kingsley House at 427 2nd Street SE is a vernacular Hipped Roof, 2-story house form, which is a forerunner "American Four-Square" designs that appeared in many locations in Waverly before World War I. The house was built during the main wave of homebuilding in the neighborhood that extended from the 1880s through the post-World War I years. The house is considered a contributing resource

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for this National Register historic district under Criteria A and C. The garage is considered noncontributing.

The house at 427 2<sup>nd</sup> Street SE was occupied by Morton and Ethel May Kingsley after the turn of the century. Morton was one of several attorneys who resided in this neighborhood through the years. A brief biography published in 1914 appears below:

Morton M. Kingsley, an able and successful representative of the legal fraternity in Bremer county, was for a number of years engaged in practice at Waverly as a member of the firm of Long & Kingsley but since his partner's death in 1912 has been alone. His birth occurred on the Kingsley farm north of Waverly on the 14th of September, 1875, his parents being Calvin and Mary W. (Williams) Kingsley, the former born in Rockford, Illinois, on the 6th of May, 1837, and the latter in Great Barrington, Massachusetts, on the 19th of September, 1839. Calvin Kingsley, an agriculturist by occupation, came to Waverly, Iowa, in 1854, acquired land here and devoted his attention to farming pursuits throughout the remainder of his active business career. Since the spring of 1913 he has lived retired at Waverly and is now enjoying the evening of life in well earned ease. The period of his residence in this county covers almost six decades and he enjoys an extensive and favorable acquaintance within its borders.

Morton M. Kingsley, the fifth in the order of birth in a family of seven children, acquired his early education in Waverly and was graduated from the Waverly high school with the class of 1895. Subsequently he attended Knox College at Galesburg, Illinois, and was graduated from that institution with the class of 1900. In further preparation for a professional career he entered the law department of the University of Michigan and in 1903 won the degree of LL.B. In the fall of that year he began the practice of law at Waverly, and in the spring of 1904, the law firm of Long & Kingsley was formed, which association was maintained with mutual pleasure and profit until the demise of Mr. Long on the 27th of July, 1912. Since that time Mr. Kingsley has been in the practice alone, devoting his attention exclusively to a general law practice. He has acquired the reputation for being an able, careful and conscientious attorney. The matter of litigation is necessarily a part of his professional business, but he has a theory that it is the duty of a good attorney to save his clients from litigation in matters entrusted to him if he can consistently do so, and has already made a good record in his ability to get matters satisfactorily adjusted out of court.

On the 24th of January, 1905, Mr. Kingsley was united in marriage to Miss Ethel Van Patten of Aurora, Illinois. They now have three children, as follows: Janet Miriam, who was born on the 28th of July,1909; Edgar Neil, whose birth occurred March 7, 1911; and Virginia, whose natal day was June 22, 1913.

Mr. Kingsley is the owner of valuable property in Waverly and has long been numbered among the substantial and respected citizens of his native county. Politically, he has given his allegiance to the republican party. Locally, he has served many years on the Waverly school board and is now a member of that body. His religious faith is that of the Baptist

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church, while fraternally he is identified with the Masons. He has cooperated in many movements for the general good, has cast his influence on the side of improvement and has advocated high ideals of manhood and citizenship as well as of professional service. Morton Kingsley died in 1938 and his wife Ethel lived until 1967. Both are buried in Harlington Cemetery.

In 1962 the house was transferred to Lowell and Bonnie Granneman. Lowell is employed at John Deere and Bonnie works at St. Paul's School. The Grannemans continue to reside here in their 50<sup>th</sup> year of ownership in 2012.


