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
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7. Description

This 1-story single-family house is estimated to have been built in 1925 according to Bremer County Assessor records. It is located on the last section of land developed in a four-lot parcel acquired by Francis Schlutsmeyer in 1889 from W.M. Woodford. By 1913 the city directory listed Henry and Francis Schlutsmeyer living at 309 Madison St. (3rd Ave. SE) with their son Ernest and his wife, Beulah, next door at this house at 315 3rd Ave SE. A third house had been built at 317 3rd Street. This lot was the last developed in 1925 when newspaper accounts report Jack Donahue was building on S. Harmon (3rd St.). The 1926 phone directory shows him residing at this address and the 1927 Sanborn Map depicts the house in place. The 1925 date appears accurate.

This 1-story brick house is an example of a Craftsman Style Clipped-Gable Bungalow with an underground single-car garage bay. Its plan likely derived from a patternbook or plans promoted by the manufacturer of the brick tile used in the house. It has a low-pitched clipped-gable roof with a lowpitched hipped roof porch and clipped gable rear wing. The eaves are wide for the main house and along the porch roof. The 1927 Sanborn Map view (right) does not show the porch though it is undoubtedly original.

The Donahue House has a concrete block foundation with multi-colored red, gray and brown brick for the walls. The bricks are a mix of standard and Roman brick (10 to 12 inches in length) and were likely manufactured by one of the Mason City



brickworks that was producing at their peak during this period. The house has a low-pitched sidegabled roof with wide clipped gable ends to the north and south. The rear of the building has a matching clipped-gable section of similar proportions. All of the roof sections have wide eaves and a narrow cornice. The building's small front porch is centered on the west façade and features a broad clipped-gable roof like the main house gables. It has a matching brick foundation with a row of standard sized solider brick at the ground level, a low brick balustrade across the front, square brick columns at the outer corners and a concrete landing accessed by matching sets of stairs from the north and south. The steps have brick balustrades with concrete caps and short brick walls with concrete caps mark the edges of the concrete landings at each end. A massive exposed brick chimney is on the north side of the house.

Fenestration includes a variety of window types and placements. On the front façade, groups of three tall multi-light casements flank the porch with a pair of similar fixed-sash on each side of the centered entrance door. Other windows appearing in groups three, singles and pairs were 4/1 double-hung units with vertical lights in the upper sash. On the north side of the house, a rectilinear bay window with a shed roof and exposed rafters has three such windows. A single horizontal fixed sash to the right of the chimney has a similar Craftsman Style vertical-light window configuration. The basement level windows have three vertical lights and the horizontal gable sash on both the north and south facades

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have five vertical lights. For most of the window openings, the sills are composed of header brick with no special brick arch.

The house has a single-bay garage in the basement level with poured concrete retaining walls lining the access drive that opens onto 3rd Ave SE. The replacement overhead door has a wood and glass paneled door. An additional parking pad has been established alongside the very narrow tunnel-like access drive connecting to the basement car space.

Alterations: porch enclosed (post-1927); garage built (1977); gambrel peak window closed (undated).

8. Significance

The John and Margaret Donahue House at 323 3rd Street is a good example of a Craftsman Style Clipped-Gable Bungalow. Built of the type of brick manufactured in Mason City brickworks several counties to the west, the house was part of the homebuilding efforts that comprised infilling vacant lots in the neighborhood during the decades following World War I. The house qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places both individually and as a contributing resource in the historic district under Criteria A and C.

John "Jack" Donahue and his wife Margaret built this house on a small corner lot at the intersection of 3rd Street and 3rd Avenue. Jack had worked as a clerk at the Hiller Clothing Store a decade earlier according to the 1913 city directory. The Donahues were members of St. Mary's Catholic Church in the neighborhood and continued to reside at this address into the 1950s. Both were buried at St. Mary's Cemetery upon their deaths.




