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#### 7. Description

The Russell-Tegtmeier House at 418 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1915 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. Property transfer records show the lot as one of two changing hands on July 16, 1917 to Frank Kohagen. Newspaper accounts identify Kohagen as buying the lot at auction with plans to undertake construction of a residence for his wife and himself later that season (*Bremer County Independent - 7/19/1917*, at right). The house was nearing completion in December 1917 when Frank died while

Frank Kohagen, who purchased the two west lots of Giles & McDaniels at auction last Saturday, expects to build thereon this season. He will erect a modern residence which will be a credit to the town and to that neighborhood. We will be glad to welcome Mr. and Mrs. Kohagen as residents of Waverly.

working at the house on the corner lot to the west of the property at 418 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave SW. In 1922, the Kohagen heirs sold the property at 418 to Ralph Russell, a mason. The next five years are a more likely period for construction of this house. Russell held the property until 1927 selling it with a house in place to W.C. Tegtmeier. It is not clear if the house was occupied or rented by Tegtmeier before it was resold in the 1930s.

The post-World War I date is consistent with the house's form and design. The house is an example of a vernacular Hipped Roof, 1-story house form with Craftsman Style or Prairie School Style design elemens. The house has a concrete block foundation with mottled reddish brown-colored brick walls. The walls are laid in running bond with a course of soldier brick used for the water table and cast stone used for the window sills. An exposed chimney of matching brick pierces the eave on the west façade. The house has a narrow and deep rectangular plan with a compound low-pitched hipped or pyramid roof with wide eaves. The contiguous hipped roof screen porch is on the west half of the front façade with a small shed roofed section on the right half – all part of the original plan. Three brick piers project from the front facade marking the dimensions of the screen porch and the right corner of the house. For the porch, a closed brick balustrade has a continuous row of tall and narrow 1/1 screens above the south and west walls. Fenestration for the house includes single and paired 1/1 double-hung windows. The property has a single-bay detached garage constructed at the same time house was built. The garage at the rear has a low-pitched hipped roof with stucco cladding on the walls. The overhead door has been replaced

#### 8. Significance

The Russell-Tegtmeier House at 418 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue SW derives individual significance under Criterion C as well-preserved example of a vernacular Hipped Roof, 1-story house form from the pre-World War I period. The house incorporates horizontal elements of early Prairie School Style and Craftsman Style bungalows. The building's high level of integrity adds to the house's architectural qualities. The garage is also considered contributing and it adds to the Prairie School and Craftsman Style design of the house. The house is also significant as a contributing resource in the Sturdevant SW Historic District under both Criteria A and C. The historic district qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as a well-preserved collection of mid and late 19th century and early 20th century architectural styles and vernacular house forms located in Waverly's southwest residential neighborhood. The neighborhood developed as a middle class and working class residential district from the late 1850s through the mid-20th century.

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#### Historical Background for Waverly<sup>1</sup>

Waverly was established in 1853 along the Cedar River in Waverly Township located in southeastern Bremer County. It was designated as the county seat for Bremer County the same year that the county was officially organized and was formally incorporated in 1859. Like most lowa towns established before the Civil War, growth during the early 1860s was deferred until after the war came to a close. Waverly's first railroad, the Cedar Falls and Minnesota Railroad was extended to Waverly in 1864. Eventually track was also laid for other branch lines and an electric interurban. By 1917 track for branch lines was absorbed by the Chicago and Great Western Railroad and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad. Track for the electric interurban – the Waterloo, Cedar Falls, and Northern – was laid in 1910 but usage was never as substantial as predicted.

Waverly grew in the manner typical of other lowa county seats in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century. Its commercial center extended along the east-west route of Bremer Avenue on both sides of the Bremer Avenue Bridge that crossed the L-shaped course of the Cedar River as it passed through the center of town. The county courthouse was located outside of the commercial area on a slight prominence at the east end of Bremer Avenue. Residential districts grew up in the four quadrants formed by the intersecting main street and river. The broad, generally flat profile of both the business district and early residential neighborhoods saw the regular occurrence of flooding resulting in the gradual replacement of most first generation frame building stock. German immigrants were among the largest ethnic group to populate Waverly during the 19<sup>th</sup> century establishing religious institutions with ethnic affiliations such as St. Paul's Lutheran Church in the northwest quadrant, St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in southeast quadrant, and the German Methodist Church.

Bremer County and its county seat of Waverly prospered during the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century becoming a retail and professional services center for Bremer County and sections of adjacent Butler County. The county's standing as the "Dairy Spot of Iowa," gave rise to a number of dairy industries including a manufacturing plant operated by the Carnation Milk Products Company for the production of condensed milk in the 1920s. Population stood at 16,300 people in 1900 before the growth rate slowed before World War I. By 1930 population topped 17,000. Expansion of a Lutheran seminary in Waverly first located in the community in 1879 through the relocation of Wartburg College to the community in 1939 was a cultural and economic stimulus for the community. Waverly continued to add a 1,000 people per decade until 1950 when the post-War boom saw growth accelerate to more than 21,000 by 1960. During the past 50 years population has slowed somewhat topping out at 23,325 in 2000.

Historical Background for the Russell-Tegtmeier House at 418 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue SW

The Russell-Tegtmeier House is located in the southwest quadrant of Waverly that includes additions platted by early Waverly settlers, Ira Sturdevant and his son William Sturdevant. The Sturdevant family moved to the unsettled area along the Cedar River in the mid-1850s. Ira received a 40-acre federal land grant based on his military service in the War of 1812. William acquired 80 acres of adjoining land to the north of his father's 40-acre parcel. In 1857 the William Sturdevant's Addition was laid out and in 1860 the Ira Sturdevant Addition was platted. Growth remained relatively slow in these subdivisions until after the Civil War.

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Frank Kohagen Dies Suddenly.

Again this community is called upon to mourn the death of a good citizen, in the person of Frank C. Kohagen, of Warren township. Last Saturday Mr. Kohagen came to town as had been his custom lately to help about the new house he was just completing in the Third ward. He had helped with the work in and about the house for several hours, when at about 4:30 he remarked that he believed he would drive out home. After getting into his wagon he complained to his companion that he had a bad headache. When they reached Broadie's drug store he said that his head seemed bursting and he decided to go up and see Dr Kern. He left the wagon and ascended the stairway to the doctor's office. As he stepped into the office he reeled and almost fell to the floor. He was given immediate medical attention and the family were summoned from their home in the country. Upon their ar-rival, and after a consultation, it was decided to take Mr. Kohagen to the hospital, where everything possible was done for him, but to no avail. He had lapsed into unconsciousness while at the doctor's office and remained in

at the doctor's omce and remained in that condition until death came at about ten o'clock Sunday morning.

Frank C. Kohagen was born in the state of New York on Oct. 10, 1861. When one year old he came to this county with his parents, who settled on the farm in Warren township upon which he had made his home ever since, the property passing from father to son.

All his fifty-six years have been useful years and by his thrift, industry and strict integrity he has amased a comfortable fortune and was just preparing to move into his beautiful new house in town, which is about completed, and enjoy a rest from the strenuous labors on the farm.

Some fifteen years ago he suffered a slight stroke of apoplexy, but apparently had quickly recovered and had enjoyed fairly good health up to the time of his sudden death.

On July 3, 1886, he was united in marriage to Miss Minnie Thiemann and to this union were born five children: Rudolph, Mrs. J. C. Hildebrandt, Mrs. Louis Oltrogge, Mrs. Herman Oltrogge, all residing in the townships of Warren and Jefferson, this county, and Miss Esther, who is still at home. The widow and children are left to mourn the death of a most faithful and loving husband and father, and the community is called on to mourn the death of one of its most successful farmers and influential citizens, just at a time when he had about completed arrangements to retire from active life and enjoy some of the fruits of his labor.

The funeral services will be held at the home at 12 o'clock Thursday, Rev.

Melcher officiating and burial will be in the Warren St. Paul's cemetery. The house at 418 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue SW was estimated to have been constructed in 1915 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. Property transfer records, however, show the lot changing hands on July 16, 1917 to Frank Kohagen, a Warren Township farmer at the time. Newspaper accounts identify Kohagen as having plans for construction of a house in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Ward later that season in the (Bremer County Independent, 7/19/1917). The paper suggested that neighbors would welcome the Hagens to the 3<sup>rd</sup> Ward neighborhood. By October 11, 1917, the Bremer County Independent reported that "The fine new house of Frank Kohagen has progressed nicely the past week and is now enclosed and almost ready for the plasterers." This house is believed to be the two story residence at 422 3rd Ave SW immediately west of the 1-story brick house. Before the corner house was fully completed, however, tragedy struck the Kohagen family. Shortly after Christmas 1917, Frank Kohagen passed away suddenly after having spent part of the day working at the house under construction on West Madison Avenue (3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue SW). The details of his death appeared in his lengthy obituary at left in the December 27, 1917 issue of the Bremer County Independent. Minnie Kohagen and members of the Kohagen family appeared residing at this house in telephone directories at 422 Madison St. through the 1950s. Esther Kohagan, Frank and Minnie's youngest daughter, owned the property after Minnie's death in 1956 and continued to reside here in the early 1960s.

Meanwhile, the property at 418 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave SW was sold in 1922 by the Kohagen heirs to Ralph Russell, a masonry contractor. Sometime during the next five years during which time Russell held the property, he is attributed as having built the house for rental or resale purposes. In1927 he sold the completed building to W.C. Tegtmeier. It is not clear if the house was occupied or rented by Tegtmeier before it was resold in the 1930s first to Fredericka Bartels (1934) and then to Carl and Clara Graening (1936). The Graening family and their descendants held the house until ca. 1982.

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
