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### 7. Description

The McCoy House at 606 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue SW is estimated by the Bremer County Assessor to have been constructed in 1902. This date is consistent with the style, materials (stone foundation) and form for this building, both of which pre-date 1905 in Waverly. Property transfer records show the property transferred from B.C. Dickinson, a real estate agent, to Anna McCoy on 3/5/1900. She passed ownership to William McCoy (family relationship unknown) on 3/18/1905. It remained in the McCoy family until 9/27/2019.

The house is an example of a vernacular Cross-Gabled Roof, 2-Story residential form with Queen Anne Style detailing. The building has a stone block foundation with a mix of narrow wood clapboard siding on the first and second floors and a band of cove-cut shingles between levels and for the gable finishes. Corner board trim, belt course boards, and scroll-cut moldings setting off the canted corners of the front façade finish off the Queen Anne ornamentation. The house has a complex roof pattern consisting of a steeply pitched front-gabled roof wing centered on the side-gabled main block. Gabled wall dormers on both sides of the front-gabled wing and a low-pitched hipped roof porch is tucked in the right-hand ell. The side porch has a turned roof supports, a balustrade with turned spindles and spindled brackets at each of the posts. The original skirting has been replaced by diagonal sheet lattice panels. Entrance steps face the front opposite the entrance door.

Fenestration includes single 1/1 double-hung windows. The feature window group is located on the gabled end of the front wing. A cottage window with an upper sash outlined by stained glass lights is flanked by 1/1 double-hung units in the canted walls to either side. Decorative scroll-cut moldings are mounted above each of the canted windows. An elaborate sunburst molding is retained in the front gable peak. The property has a double-bay frame garage built in 1995 and is considered noncontributing.

#### 8. Significance

The McCoy House at 606 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue SW derives individual significance under Criterion C as a wellpreserved example of a vernacular Cross-Gabled Roof, 2-Story residential form with Queen Anne Style detailing. It may be an example of a pattern book house though a number of similar houses are attributed to local contractors. The building's high level of integrity enhances its significance. The garage is considered noncontributing.

### Historical Background for Waverly<sup>1</sup>

Waverly was established in 1853 along the Cedar River in Waverly Township located in southeastern Bremer County. It was designated as the county seat for Bremer County the same year that the county was officially organized and was formally incorporated in 1859. Like most lowa towns established before the Civil War, growth during the early 1860s was deferred until after the war came to a close. Waverly's first railroad, the Cedar Falls and Minnesota Railroad was extended to Waverly in 1864. Eventually track was also laid for other branch lines and an electric interurban. By 1917 track for branch lines was absorbed by the Chicago and Great Western Railroad and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad.

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Track for the electric interurban – the Waterloo, Cedar Falls, and Northern – was laid in 1910 but usage was never as substantial as predicted.

Waverly grew in the manner typical of other lowa county seats in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century. Its commercial center extended along the east-west route of Bremer Avenue on both sides of the Bremer Avenue Bridge that crossed the L-shaped course of the Cedar River as it passed through the center of town. The county courthouse was located outside of the commercial area on a slight prominence at the east end of Bremer Avenue. Residential districts grew up in the four quadrants formed by the intersecting main street and river. The broad, generally flat profile of both the business district and early residential neighborhoods saw the regular occurrence of flooding resulting in the gradual replacement of most first generation frame building stock. German immigrants were among the largest ethnic group to populate Waverly during the 19<sup>th</sup> century establishing religious institutions with ethnic affiliations such as St. Paul's Lutheran Church in the northwest quadrant, St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in southeast quadrant, and the German Methodist Church.

Bremer County and its county seat of Waverly prospered during the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century becoming a retail and professional services center for Bremer County and sections of adjacent Butler County. The county's standing as the "Dairy Spot of Iowa," gave rise to a number of dairy industries including a manufacturing plant operated by the Carnation Milk Products Company for the production of condensed milk in the 1920s. Population stood at 16,300 people in 1900 before the growth rate slowed before World War I. By 1930 population topped 17,000. Expansion of a Lutheran seminary in Waverly first located in the community in 1879 through the relocation of Wartburg College to the community in 1939 was a cultural and economic stimulus for the community. Waverly continued to add a 1,000 people per decade until 1950 when the post-War boom saw growth accelerate to more than 21,000 by 1960. During the past 50 years population has slowed somewhat topping out at 23,325 in 2000.

### Historical Background for the McCoy House at 606 3rd Avenue SW

The McCoy House at 606 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1902 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. This date is consistent with the vernacular architectural form and materials of the building. The house is located in the southwest quadrant of Waverly that includes additions platted by Ira Sturdevant and his son William Sturdevant. The Sturdevant family moved to the unsettled area along the Cedar River in the mid-1850s. Ira received a 40-acre federal land grant based on his military service in the War of 1812. William acquired 80 acres of adjoining land to the north of his father's 40-acre parcel. In 1857 the William Sturdevant's Addition was laid out and in 1860 the Ira Sturdevant Addition was platted. Growth remained relatively slow in these subdivisions with formal incorporation of the community not taking place until 1859. William subsequently died in the Civil War. The house at 606 3<sup>rd</sup> Avenue SW was not completed until more than three decades after the war ended.

Property transfer records show the property transferred from B.C. Dickinson, a real estate agent, to Anna McCoy on 3/5/1900. She passed ownership to William McCoy (family relationship unknown) on 3/18/1905. William and his wife Catherine worked and resided with their large family on a farm in Lafayette Township in Bremer Co. in 1895 and are never known to have lived on 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave SW. William died in 1916 and his wife Catherine died four years later in 1920. Prior to their death, the property passed to William's heirs.

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In an unrelated news account, Wm. McCoy is listed as having another home under construction with the carpentry work by J.J. Shane nearing completion in the 1<sup>st</sup> Ward on July 24, 1902 in the *Waverly Republican*. This would have been prior to William's ownership of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave SW property but does confirm his ownership of Waverly residential real estate while still residing on his farm in Lafayette Township.

On 9/27/1919 the 3<sup>rd</sup> Ave SW property was sold outside of the family by his heirs to G.A. Chambers, another farmer from Lafayette Township. It appears likely that the house was used by both family's rental purposes. Occupants of the house in 1913 were Lucinda and C. Kellogg. Mr. Kellogg had no employment at the time. Property transfer records do not show the Kelloggs as owners of the property. The property passed from G.A. Chambers and his wife, Maude, in May 1933.




