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7. Description

The Vosseller House at 701 West Bremer Avenue is estimated to have been constructed in 1929 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. This date is consistent with the building's form and design and documented dates for nearby houses along 7th Street SW and the 700 block of West Bremer Avenue. Property transfer records show the lot passed to George M Vosseller on 12/6/1929, a date that is consistent with the Assessor's record.

The house is an example of the Craftsman Style Side-Gabled Roof, 1½-Story house form. The main house has a moderate-pitched side-gabled roof with a projecting front gable wing giving the house a T-shaped floor plan. Each of the gabled ends has a clipped gable or jerkin head peak with medium width eaves along the sloped sides lined with exposed rafters. A shed-roofed dormer on the rear appears to be a later addition as it has a stucco finish. The house has a concrete block foundation clad in mottled brown and tan colored brick with matching brick on the walls. The brick is similar to Mason City brick manufactured during the early decades of the 20th century. The brick is laid in running bond with soldier courses at the water table and above the windows and door ways. The window sills are made of rowlock courses.

Fenestration includes typical Craftsman Style double-hung windows with 3/1 configurations (vertical lights in the upper sash). The projecting front gable wing has a pair of sash on the left half and a shallow recessed entrance opening on the right with brick balustrades along the entrance steps. To either side of the projecting front gable wing, narrower paired 3/1 double-hung windows are present. A small horizontal window is beneath the clipped gable peak. On the east façade facing 7th Street SW, a shed-roofed rectilinear oriel has exposed rafters along the eave and a group of three 3/1 double-hung sash. Also on this façade a group of three single-light casements are on the first floor and on the second floor a pair of 3/1 double-hung sash have small 2-light fixed sash to either side.

The house has an attached single-bay brick garage with a hipped roof on the rear (south) façade. Its moderate-pitched hipped roof has exposed rafters along the eaves. The overhead door has wood and glass panels and replaced the original bi-fold wood doors at an unknown date. It is accessed from the alley.

8. Significance

The George and Marjorie Vosseller House at 701 West Bremer Avenue derives individual significance under Criterion C as a well-preserved example of a Craftsman Style residence built using the Side-Gabled, 2-Story house form with clipped gable peaks. The building's likely use of Mason City brick and its high level of integrity add to its significance. The house is also significant as a contributing resource in the Sturdevant SW Historic District under both Criteria A and C. The historic district qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as a well-preserved collection of mid and late 19th century and early 20th century architectural styles and vernacular house forms located in Waverly's southwest residential neighborhood. The neighborhood developed as a middle class and working class residential district from the late 1850s through the mid-20th century.

Historical Background for Waverly¹

Address

Waverly was established in 1853 along the Cedar River in Waverly Township located in southeastern Bremer County. It was designated as the county seat for Bremer County the same year that the county was officially organized and was formally incorporated in 1859. Like most lowa towns established before the Civil War, growth during the early 1860s was deferred until after the war came to a close. Waverly's first railroad, the Cedar Falls and Minnesota Railroad was extended to Waverly in 1864. Eventually track was also laid for other branch lines and an electric interurban. By 1917 track for branch lines was absorbed by the Chicago and Great Western Railroad and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad. Track for the electric interurban – the Waterloo, Cedar Falls, and Northern – was laid in 1910 but usage was never as substantial as predicted.

Waverly grew in the manner typical of other lowa county seats in the late 19th and early 20th century. Its commercial center extended along the east-west route of Bremer Avenue on both sides of the Bremer Avenue Bridge that crossed the L-shaped course of the Cedar River as it passed through the center of town. The county courthouse was located outside of the commercial area on a slight prominence at the east end of Bremer Avenue. Residential districts grew up in the four quadrants formed by the intersecting main street and river. The broad, generally flat profile of both the business district and early residential neighborhoods saw the regular occurrence of flooding resulting in the gradual replacement of most first generation frame building stock. German immigrants were among the largest ethnic group to populate Waverly during the 19th century establishing religious institutions with ethnic affiliations such as St. Paul's Lutheran Church in the northwest quadrant, St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in southeast quadrant, and the German Methodist Church.

Bremer County and its county seat of Waverly prospered during the late 19th and early 20th century becoming a retail and professional services center for Bremer County and sections of adjacent Butler County. The county's standing as the "Dairy Spot of Iowa," gave rise to a number of dairy industries including a manufacturing plant operated by the Carnation Milk Products Company for the production of condensed milk in the 1920s. Population stood at 16,300 people in 1900 before the growth rate slowed before World War I. By 1930 population topped 17,000. Expansion of a Lutheran seminary in Waverly first located in the community in 1879 through the relocation of Wartburg College to the community in 1939 was a cultural and economic stimulus for the community. Waverly continued to add a 1,000 people per decade until 1950 when the post-War boom saw growth accelerate to more than 21,000 by 1960. During the past 50 years population has slowed somewhat topping out at 23,325 in 2000.

Historical Background for the Vosseller House at 701 West Bremer Avenue

The Vosseller House is located along the northern edge of the southwest quadrant of Waverly that includes additions platted by Ira Sturdevant and his son William Sturdevant. The Sturdevant family moved to the unsettled area along the Cedar River in the mid-1850s. Ira received a 40-acre federal land grant based on his military service in the War of 1812. William acquired 80 acres of adjoining land to the north of his father's 40-acre parcel. In 1857 the William Sturdevant's Addition was laid out and in 1860 the Ira Sturdevant Addition was platted. Growth remained relatively slow in these subdivisions with formal incorporation of the community

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not taking place until 1859. After World War I, a substantial number of new houses were built along West Bremer Avenue and on still vacant lots in William Sturdevant's Addition to the south.

The Vosseller House at 701 West Bremer Avenue is estimated to have been constructed in 1929 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. Property transfer records show that the parcel was part of a larger plot of land along the south side of West Bremer Avenue owned by the Nathaniel Ellis family before it was sold to George Vosseller on 12/6/1929. It remained in his ownership until after his death when it passed to Marjorie Vosseller Schield, his daughter. She and her husband, Vern Schield, never lived in the house instead renting it and the couple resided here until the house passed to JoAnn E. Schwartz, granddaughter of George Vosseller, in 1979. JoAnn Schwartz continues to own and reside in the house in 2015.




