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Bates, George L. and Amelia, House	Bremer
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7. Description

The George L. and Amelia Bates House at 620 1st Avenue SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1875 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. This date is incorrect. It is not consistent with the building's form and design nor does the house appear on the 1894 Sanborn Map. The property was owned by Lillian Ellis Clarke beginning in 1903 when she held all of Block 18 prior to dividing off parcels for individual house lots. This lot was transferred to George L. Bates on 3/8/1911 and the house appears in the 1913 city directory with Bates and his wife Amelia occupying this address. A news account of the house's construction appeared on 6/15/1911 in the *Bremer County Independent* discussing progress on George Bates' new house in the 3rd Ward. 1911 is a more accurate construction date.

The house is an example of a vernacular Hipped Roof, 2-Story house form from the early 20th century. Its form suggests its design was similar to the American Four-Square form from the pre-WW I years but alterations in windows, porch detailing, and possibly the addition of stucco cladding diminish this design. The building has a concrete foundation with stucco on the walls. It has a low-pitched hipped roof with no dormers and a low-pitched hipped roof porch spans the front façade with wrought iron posts replacing the original roof supports. Fenestration includes tall 1/1 double-hung windows widely spaced on all facades. Larger narrow cottage windows flank the off-set entrance. The property has a double-bay stucco-clad garage with a front-gable roof built in 1928. The garage is considered noncontributing.

8. Significance

The Bates House at 620 1st Avenue SW derives significance as a contributing resource in the Sturdevant SW Historic District under both Criteria A and C. The historic district qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as a well-preserved collection of mid and late 19th century and early 20th century architectural styles and vernacular house forms located in Waverly's southwest residential neighborhood.

Historical Background for Waverly¹

Waverly was established in 1853 along the Cedar River in Waverly Township located in southeastern Bremer County. It was designated as the county seat for Bremer County the same year that the county was officially organized and was formally incorporated in 1859. Like most lowa towns established before the Civil War, growth during the early 1860s was deferred until after the war came to a close. Waverly's first railroad, the Cedar Falls and Minnesota Railroad was extended to Waverly in 1864. Eventually track was also laid for other branch lines and an electric interurban. By 1917 track for branch lines was absorbed by the Chicago and Great Western Railroad and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad. Track for the electric interurban – the Waterloo, Cedar Falls, and Northern – was laid in 1910 but usage was never as substantial as predicted.

Waverly grew in the manner typical of other lowa county seats in the late 19th and early 20th century. Its commercial center extended along the east-west route of Bremer Avenue on both sides of the Bremer Avenue Bridge that crossed the L-shaped course of the Cedar River as it passed through the center of town. The county courthouse was located outside of the commercial area on a slight prominence at the east end of

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Bremer Avenue. Residential districts grew up in the four quadrants formed by the intersecting main street and river. The broad, generally flat profile of both the business district and early residential neighborhoods saw the regular occurrence of flooding resulting in the gradual replacement of most first generation frame building stock. German immigrants were among the largest ethnic group to populate Waverly during the 19th century establishing religious institutions with ethnic affiliations such as St. Paul's Lutheran Church in the northwest quadrant, St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in southeast quadrant, and the German Methodist Church.

Bremer County and its county seat of Waverly prospered during the late 19th and early 20th century becoming a retail and professional services center for Bremer County and sections of adjacent Butler County. The county's standing as the "Dairy Spot of Iowa," gave rise to a number of dairy industries including a manufacturing plant operated by the Carnation Milk Products Company for the production of condensed milk in the 1920s. Population stood at 16,300 people in 1900 before the growth rate slowed before World War I. By 1930 population topped 17,000. Expansion of a Lutheran seminary in Waverly first located in the community in 1879 through the relocation of Wartburg College to the community in 1939 was a cultural and economic stimulus for the community. Waverly continued to add a 1,000 people per decade until 1950 when the post-War boom saw growth accelerate to more than 21,000 by 1960. During the past 50 years population has slowed somewhat topping out at 23,325 in 2000.

Historical Background for the George L. and Amelia Bates House at 620 1st Avenue SW

The George L. and Amelia Bates House is located in Block 18 of the Wm. Sturdevant Addition. The southwest quadrant of Waverly includes additions platted by early Waverly settlers, Ira Sturdevant and his son William Sturdevant. The Sturdevant family moved to the unsettled area along the Cedar River in the mid-1850s. Ira received a 40-acre federal land grant based on his military service in the War of 1812. William acquired 80 acres of adjoining land to the north of his father's 40-acre parcel. In 1857 the William Sturdevant's Addition was laid out and in 1860 the Ira Sturdevant Addition was platted. Growth remained relatively slow in these subdivisions until after the Civil War.

The Bates House is estimated to have been constructed in 1875 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. This date is not consistent with the building's form and design. Nor does the house appear on the 1894 Sanborn Map. The property was owned by Lillian Ellis Clarke beginning in 1903 when she held all of Block 18 prior to dividing off parcels for individual house lots. It is likely that the 1875 date referred to the date for the single house that stood in the middle of Block 18 at the time – the residence built for her parents, Nathan and Cinderella Ellis. A smaller lot at the northeast corner of 1st Ave SW and 7th St SW was transferred to George L. Bates on 3/8/1911. A news account from the *Bremer Count Independent* on 6/15/1911 states the following:

"Workmen are making good progress on the Geo Bates residence on the lots he purchased of Mrs. Allen Clark in the Third ward. George has a splendid location and is putting up a fine residence."

Later that year, the house appears in the 1913 city directory with Bates and his wife Amelia occupying this address. Bates worked as a cooper earlier in his life (1895 Iowa Census Records) but likely was retired by the time he and his wife resided at 620 1st Ave SW since no occupation was listed.

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In 1920, George and Amelia sold their house to R.K. Thompson who held it until 1927. He transferred it to Gwendolyn Merriam who resold it two years later to Jerome Young. The 1931 telephone directory shows Young residing there. Transfer records show various members of the Young family holding the property until 1994 when Mavis Young sold the house to Bard and Nadine Mackey.


