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7. Description

The Dickinson House at 202 1st St SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1888 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. This date is consistent with the building's form though its details are likely a somewhat later change. Jonathan "Johnny" Dickinson was the owner of all of Lot 1 in 1887 when newspaper accounts between January and May describe the purchase and removal of the existing buildings on the lot and plans for construction on his new house on the same lot along West Water Street (1st St SW). A building with the same footprint appears on the 1894 Sanborn Map at this intersection and the 1899 city directory lists the Dickinson family residing here. These public records confirm the likelihood that 1888 is an accurate construction date.

The Dickinson House is an example of the vernacular Gable-Front-and-Wing 2-Story house form. The house has a parged stone foundation with asbestos shingle siding (Transite®) on the walls. The house has a moderate pitched intersecting gabled roof with clipped-gable peaks and wide eaves. A clipped-gable wall dormer is located in the south wing and a low-pitched hipped roofed enclosed entrance porch is on the left half of the front façade. The porch has siding on the closed balustrade, continuous 1/1 double-hung windows above the rail and square columns resting on the rail. The original skirting had narrowly spaced vertical lattice boards that remain in place. A rear 1-story gable roof wing and separate entrance were likely added sometime after 1921 when the house was owned by Dr. Herman Nygren, a veterinarian, who had his office/clinic in the building along with the family residence. The 1-story rear addition has a moderate pitched gable roof.

Fenestration includes widely spaced single and paired 1/1 double-hung windows of various sizes, arranged both asymmetrically and symmetrically on the facades. The property has no garage.

8. Significance

The Dickinson House at 202 1st Street SW derives significance as a contributing resource in the Sturdevant SW Historic District under both Criteria A (Community Development) and C (Architecture). The historic district qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as a well-preserved collection of mid and late 19th century and early 20th century architectural styles and vernacular house forms located in Waverly's southwest residential neighborhood. The neighborhood developed as a middle class and working class residential district from the late 1850s through the mid-20th century.

Historical Background for Waverly¹

Waverly was established in 1853 along the Cedar River in Waverly Township located in southeastern Bremer County. It was designated as the county seat for Bremer County the same year that the county was officially organized and was formally incorporated in 1859. Like most lowa towns established before the Civil War, growth during the early 1860s was deferred until after the war came to a close. Waverly's first railroad, the Cedar Falls and Minnesota Railroad was extended to Waverly in 1864. Eventually track was also laid for other branch lines and an electric interurban. By 1917 track for branch lines was absorbed by the Chicago and

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Great Western Railroad and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad. Track for the electric interurban – the Waterloo, Cedar Falls, and Northern – was laid in 1910 but usage was never as substantial as predicted.

Waverly grew in the manner typical of other lowa county seats in the late 19th and early 20th century. Its commercial center extended along the east-west route of Bremer Avenue on both sides of the Bremer Avenue Bridge that crossed the L-shaped course of the Cedar River as it passed through the center of town. The county courthouse was located outside of the commercial area on a slight prominence at the east end of Bremer Avenue. Residential districts grew up in the four quadrants formed by the intersecting main street and river. The broad, generally flat profile of both the business district and early residential neighborhoods saw the regular occurrence of flooding resulting in the gradual replacement of most first generation frame building stock. German immigrants were among the largest ethnic group to populate Waverly during the 19th century establishing religious institutions with ethnic affiliations such as St. Paul's Lutheran Church in the northwest quadrant, St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in southeast quadrant, and the German Methodist Church.

Bremer County and its county seat of Waverly prospered during the late 19th and early 20th century becoming a retail and professional services center for Bremer County and sections of adjacent Butler County. The county's standing as the "Dairy Spot of Iowa," gave rise to a number of dairy industries including a manufacturing plant operated by the Carnation Milk Products Company for the production of condensed milk in the 1920s. Population stood at 16,300 people in 1900 before the growth rate slowed before World War I. By 1930 population topped 17,000. Expansion of a Lutheran seminary in Waverly first located in the community in 1879 through the relocation of Wartburg College to the community in 1939 was a cultural and economic stimulus for the community. Waverly continued to add a 1,000 people per decade until 1950 when the post-War boom saw growth accelerate to more than 21,000 by 1960. During the past 50 years population has slowed somewhat topping out at 23,325 in 2000.

Historical Background for the Dickinson House at 202 1st St SW

The Dickinson House is located in the southwest quadrant of Waverly that includes additions platted by early Waverly settlers, Ira Sturdevant and his son William Sturdevant. The Sturdevant family moved to the unsettled area along the Cedar River in the mid-1850s. Ira received a 40-acre federal land grant based on his military service in the War of 1812. William acquired 80 acres of adjoining land to the north of his father's 40-acre parcel. In 1857 the William Sturdevant's Addition was laid out and in 1860 the Ira Sturdevant Addition was platted. Growth remained relatively slow in these subdivisions until after the Civil War.

The house at 202 1st St SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1888 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. This date is confirmed by a news accounts that appeared from January to May, 1887 in local papers (4/7 and 4/21/1887, *Waverly Republican*; 5/12/1887, *Waverly Republican* 10/6/1887, and an unidentified newspaper, "W Water St; addition & remodel," 1/4/1894, *Bremer Independent.* The accounts describe Jonathan "Johnny" Dickinson, a real estate agent with the firm Dickinson & Sundemeier (one of four real estate firms in Waverly in 1899), buying the property, removing the buildings on the property and then constructing a new house for his family. Jonathan bought the property in early April 1887 from Dan Dean with plans to repair and enlarge the house. Within a few week, he changed his plans and sold off the old Dean residence to build a new house. The house was likely completed the following year. In January 1894, the newspaper account noted that Dickinson was completing an addition and a remodeling project. In addition to

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his wife, Martha, their son Roy, a laborer, was part of the Dickinson household. Roy continued to own and occupy the house after his parents. A brief biography of John Dickinson taken from *Semi-Centennial Souvenir* of the Beautiful City, Waverly, Iowa, 1896 appears below:

DICKINSON BROS. REAL ESTATE AGENCY.

HIS enterprising firm is composed of John and B. C. Dickinson. They have done a large amount of business during the past four years. Their list of property for sale em-



and wealth.

braces many fine farms in Bremer and adjacent counties and much desirable property in Waverly and other towns. Property listed with them is sure to be handled to the best advantage of their clients. They are keen and experienced business men, can scent a buyer from afar, and once on his trail there is no escape for him until he buys. Their business is constantly growing. The real estate business had really never been pushed in Waverly until Dickinson Bros. took

hold of it and their method of advertising has resulted in bringing a number of good families from Illinois and other states to Bremer county where they have secured more desirable homes than they left, for much less money, thus benefitting themselves and at the same time reinforcing our population Both members of this firm are men of good standing in the community. Both are heads of happy families and both own and live in pretty homes in the third ward. Their business headquarters is at Hiller's clothing store, but they nail a possible purchaser wherever they can catch him. They keep a handsome team and carriage, which is always at the disposal of their customers when looking for bargains in town or coun-

try. One secret of the great success of this firm is that having traveled much and kept their eyes open they know that they can never over-praise the value of farm or town property in the Cedar valley which they love so well, and they go at a customer from abroad with an earnestness born of conviction, and before long the sale is made.

It is to be hoped they may continue to succeed in agitating the real estate market for years to come and then hand the business over to their

sons after they have retired at the close of long, useful and profitable careers.

Communications, addressed to these gentlemen, in regard to Waverly, her advantages, etc., will receive prompt reply.

In 1921 Roy Dickinson sold the property to Dr. Herman Nygren, a veterinarian, and his wife Selma. During the 1920s the Nygrens resided in a house at 202 South Harlington (1st St SW) on the east half of the lot and Herman maintained his office in the rear wing. In 1941, the Nygrens sold the house and built a new residence on the west half of the lot. Five years later the couple sold the east half of the lot at 202 1st SW but retained their new house at 109 1st Ave SW.

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Nygren, H.J., D.V.M.

Dr. H.J. Nygren, assistant state veterinarian of Iowa and a man who through his ability, energy and enterprise has gained a prominent place in the ranks of his chosen profession, was born in Lake City, Minnesota, April 27, 1880. He is a son of C.J. Nyugren, who came to America when he was a young man and located in Minnesota, engaging in farming in that state until his death. Dr. Nygren was the fifth in a family of eight children. He acquired his education in the public schools of Lake City and after laying aside his books continued on the home farm until he was twenty-one. At that time he entered the Minnesota State University, taking a three years' agricultural course, upon the completion of which he returned home. In the fall of 1906 he became a student in the Iowa State College and after studying veterinary surgery for four years was graduated in June, 1910, with the degree of D.V.M. He came immediately to Waverly and purchased the practice of Dr. Inger and this he has since successfully conducted. He keeps abreast with the most advanced thought of his profession, of which he has remained always a close and earnest student, and the most advanced and enlightened methods find in him a worthy exponent. He has secured a large and representative patronage in this vicinity and his ability is widely known and recognized. He was the first to introduce hog vaccination in the district around Waverly and during the past year has vaccinated over ten thousand hogs with remarkable results. In 1912, upon the recommendation of Dr. I.I. Gibson, Dr. Nygren was appointed by Governor B.G. Carroll assistant state veterinarian and he has since served in this office, discharging his duties capably, promptly and reliably.

In July, 1912, Dr. Nygren married Miss Selma Nordenmalm of Lake City, Minnesota, and both are well known in Waverly. Dr. Nygren stands high in professional circles, being ranked among the most skilled veterinary surgeons in this part of the state.
