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7. Description

The Daniel and Lucretia Dean House at 208 1st St SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1888 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. This date is consistent with the building's I-House form though its 2/2 double-hung window details are likely a somewhat earlier attribute. The building footprint first appears on the 1875 map of Waverly on Lot 2 of Block 2. It is likely that it was built shortly before 1875 when the owner of record was David Clarke. The property passed through a sheriff's sale in July 1878 and was purchased by Mary Dean and remained in the Dean family until1886 when Daniel and his wife Lucretia held the property. The 1885 Iowa Census confirms Daniel and Lucretia residing at Lots 1 & 2 in Block 2 that year. These various public records confirm the likelihood that ca.1875 is an accurate construction date.

The Dean House is an example of the vernacular Side-Gabled Roof, 2-story house form commonly referred to as the "I-House" form because it was popularly built in the pre and post-Civil War Years in the states of Indiana, Illinois and Iowa. The house has a stone foundation with wide aluminum clapboard style and board-and-batten siding on the walls. The main block of the house has a moderate pitched side-gabled roof with the rear 1½-story wing having a gabled roof with tall gabled attic dormers on the north and south slopes. A flat-roofed porch spans the front; the deck has been replaced with poured concrete and cement block supplementing original stone blocks for the porch post pedestals. Original porch columns have been replaced by 4x4 inch posts and there is no balustrade.

Fenestration includes widely spaced single 2/2 double-hung windows, with tall and narrow shapes typical of the 1870s and early 1880s in Iowa. A few openings have been replaced with 1/1 sashes. The major change to the house is the addition of a frame staircase leading to the second level located at the north end of the front porch. The staircase provides access to the second floor apartment. The property has no garage.

8. Significance

As one of the earliest houses in the neighborhood, the Dean House at 208 1st Street SW derives significance as a contributing resource in the Sturdevant SW Historic District under both Criteria A (Community Development) and C (Architecture). The historic district qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as a well-preserved collection of mid and late 19th century and early 20th century architectural styles and vernacular house forms located in Waverly's southwest residential neighborhood. The neighborhood developed as a middle class and working class residential district from the late 1850s through the mid-20th century.

Historical Background for Waverly¹

Waverly was established in 1853 along the Cedar River in Waverly Township located in southeastern Bremer County. It was designated as the county seat for Bremer County the same year that the county was officially organized and was formally incorporated in 1859. Like most lowa towns established before the Civil War, growth during the early 1860s was deferred until after the war came to a close. Waverly's first railroad, the Cedar Falls and Minnesota Railroad was extended to Waverly in 1864. Eventually track was also laid for other

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branch lines and an electric interurban. By 1917 track for branch lines was absorbed by the Chicago and Great Western Railroad and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad. Track for the electric interurban – the Waterloo, Cedar Falls, and Northern – was laid in 1910 but usage was never as substantial as predicted.

Waverly grew in the manner typical of other lowa county seats in the late 19th and early 20th century. Its commercial center extended along the east-west route of Bremer Avenue on both sides of the Bremer Avenue Bridge that crossed the L-shaped course of the Cedar River as it passed through the center of town. The county courthouse was located outside of the commercial area on a slight prominence at the east end of Bremer Avenue. Residential districts grew up in the four quadrants formed by the intersecting main street and river. The broad, generally flat profile of both the business district and early residential neighborhoods saw the regular occurrence of flooding resulting in the gradual replacement of most first generation frame building stock. German immigrants were among the largest ethnic group to populate Waverly during the 19th century establishing religious institutions with ethnic affiliations such as St. Paul's Lutheran Church in the northwest quadrant, St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in southeast quadrant, and the German Methodist Church.

Bremer County and its county seat of Waverly prospered during the late 19th and early 20th century becoming a retail and professional services center for Bremer County and sections of adjacent Butler County. The county's standing as the "Dairy Spot of Iowa," gave rise to a number of dairy industries including a manufacturing plant operated by the Carnation Milk Products Company for the production of condensed milk in the 1920s. Population stood at 16,300 people in 1900 before the growth rate slowed before World War I. By 1930 population topped 17,000. Expansion of a Lutheran seminary in Waverly first located in the community in 1879 through the relocation of Wartburg College to the community in 1939 was a cultural and economic stimulus for the community. Waverly continued to add a 1,000 people per decade until 1950 when the post-War boom saw growth accelerate to more than 21,000 by 1960. During the past 50 years population has slowed somewhat topping out at 23,325 in 2000.

Historical Background for the Dean House at 208 1st St SW

The Dean House is located in the southwest quadrant of Waverly that includes additions platted by early Waverly settlers, Ira Sturdevant and his son William Sturdevant. The Sturdevant family moved to the unsettled area along the Cedar River in the mid-1850s. Ira received a 40-acre federal land grant based on his military service in the War of 1812. William acquired 80 acres of adjoining land to the north of his father's 40-acre parcel. In 1857 the William Sturdevant's Addition was laid out and in 1860 the Ira Sturdevant Addition was platted. Growth remained relatively slow in these subdivisions until after the Civil War.

As noted above, the house at 208 1st St SW is estimated to have been constructed in ca. 1875 when it first appeared on the Waverly city map published that year. According to property transfer records, Lots 1 and 2 passed through a sheriff's sale in July 1878 when they were acquired by Mary Dean. They remained in the Dean family during most of the decade with Lucretia and Daniel Dean residing on this property in 1885 according to the Iowa Census for that year. The census records list 42-year old Daniel working as a liveryman and his wife keeping house. They had two sons, Harry and William, ages 7 and 5 respectively at the time.

Beginning in February 1888 the property passed through a series of short-term owners most of whom have left few historic records. In 1893, Frank and Laura Thies, ages 28 and 29, acquired the property and the 1895 lowa Census a few years later shows their family residing there. Frank was employed as a grocer and the

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couple had a one-year old son, Harvey, at the time. After 1897, the house passed through several other families before Bridget Scully took ownership in March 1912, nine years after husband William died. Both were Irish immigrants. According to the 1913 city directory, Bridget resided at 208 Water St (1st St SW) with her son John. He received the house after Bridget's death in 1922 and held the property until 1944. In 1946 the house passed to Adolph and Elsie Albrecht where the couple resided until Adolph's death. Elsie sold the property in 1967 to Richard and Ethel Bruns.




