#### 7. Description

The William H. and Carrie Bacher House at 216 1<sup>st</sup> St SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1900 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. This date is slightly late for the building's I-House form but is consistent with the post-1900 porch detailing. The building footprint first appears on the 1894 Sanborn Map of Waverly on Lot 5 of Block 2. Newspaper accounts identify Bacher building a house along West Water Street (*Bremer County Independent*, 9/15/1892) and the *Waverly Republican* shows him adding a porch in 6/4/1908. By 1895, the 1895 Iowa Census identifies the Bacher family residing along this stretch of 1<sup>st</sup> St SW. Together these public sources suggest ca. 1892 as an accurate construction date.

The Bacher House is an example of the vernacular Side-Gabled Roof, 2-story house form commonly referred to as the "I-House" form because it was popularly built in the late 19<sup>th</sup> century in the states of Indiana, Illinois and Iowa. Constructed in the early 1890s, this structure is a late example of the form. The house has a stone block foundation under the main block and rock-faced early concrete block beneath the north wing. Narrow, clapboard-style vinyl siding is on the walls of both sections. The main block of the house has a moderate pitched side-gabled roof with the north 1-story wing having a front-gabled roof with a short side-gabled addition along the north wall at the west end. A moderate-pitched hip-roofed porch spans the front and was added in 1908 according to news accounts. The 1905 Sanborn Map shows the house with both the front porch and north addition in place. The porch retains its original full-height Tuscan style columns popular in porch designs at the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> century and skirting panels constructed of closely spaced basket-weave lattice. A closed balustrade with vinyl siding matching that of the house is presently in place.

Fenestration includes widely spaced single 1/1 double-hung windows of various sizes on both the main house and the north wing. Shorter height windows are on the upper level and in the wing. The front door has a Queen Anne style window in the upper half featuring a large central glass outlined by a geometric perimeter of square and rectangular lights, both clear and colored glass. The property has a single-bay garage estimated to have been built in 1890 though more likely constructed in the 1920s or later. The free-standing garage sets at the northwest corner of the house and has wide tongue-and groove siding with corner board trim, a low-pitched front-gable roof and a replacement overhead door. The garage is considered noncontributing.

#### 8. Significance

The Bacher House at 216 1<sup>st</sup> Street SW is one of three I-houses built by 1895 along the 200 block of 1<sup>st</sup> St SW. It derives significance as a contributing resource in the Sturdevant SW Historic District under both Criteria A (Community Development) and C (Architecture). The historic district qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as a well-preserved collection of mid and late 19th century and early 20th century architectural styles and vernacular house forms located in Waverly's southwest residential neighborhood. The neighborhood developed as a middle class and working class residential district from the late 1850s through the mid-20th century. The garage is considered noncontributing.

#### Historical Background for Waverly<sup>1</sup>

Waverly was established in 1853 along the Cedar River in Waverly Township located in southeastern Bremer County. It was designated as the county seat for Bremer County the same year that the county was officially organized and was formally incorporated in 1859. Like most lowa towns established before the Civil War, growth during the early 1860s was deferred until after the war came to a close. Waverly's first railroad, the Cedar Falls and Minnesota Railroad was extended to Waverly in 1864. Eventually track was also laid for other branch lines and an electric interurban. By 1917 track for branch lines was absorbed by the Chicago and Great Western Railroad and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad. Track for the electric interurban – the Waterloo, Cedar Falls, and Northern – was laid in 1910 but usage was never as substantial as predicted.

Waverly grew in the manner typical of other lowa county seats in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century. Its commercial center extended along the east-west route of Bremer Avenue on both sides of the Bremer Avenue Bridge that crossed the L-shaped course of the Cedar River as it passed through the center of town. The county courthouse was located outside of the commercial area on a slight prominence at the east end of Bremer Avenue. Residential districts grew up in the four quadrants formed by the intersecting main street and river. The broad, generally flat profile of both the business district and early residential neighborhoods saw the regular occurrence of flooding resulting in the gradual replacement of most first generation frame building stock. German immigrants were among the largest ethnic group to populate Waverly during the 19<sup>th</sup> century establishing religious institutions with ethnic affiliations such as St. Paul's Lutheran Church in the northwest quadrant, St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in southeast quadrant, and the German Methodist Church.

Bremer County and its county seat of Waverly prospered during the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century becoming a retail and professional services center for Bremer County and sections of adjacent Butler County. The county's standing as the "Dairy Spot of Iowa," gave rise to a number of dairy industries including a manufacturing plant operated by the Carnation Milk Products Company for the production of condensed milk in the 1920s. Population stood at 16,300 people in 1900 before the growth rate slowed before World War I. By 1930 population topped 17,000. Expansion of a Lutheran seminary in Waverly first located in the community in 1879 through the relocation of Wartburg College to the community in 1939 was a cultural and economic stimulus for the community. Waverly continued to add a 1,000 people per decade until 1950 when the post-War boom saw growth accelerate to more than 21,000 by 1960. During the past 50 years population has slowed somewhat topping out at 23,325 in 2000.

## Historical Background for the Bacher House at 216 1st SW

The Bacher House is located in the southwest quadrant of Waverly that includes additions platted by early Waverly settlers, Ira Sturdevant and his son William Sturdevant. The Sturdevant family moved to the unsettled area along the Cedar River in the mid-1850s. Ira received a 40-acre federal land grant based on his military service in the War of 1812. William acquired 80 acres of adjoining land to the north of his father's 40-acre parcel. In 1857 the William Sturdevant's Addition was laid out and in 1860 the Ira Sturdevant Addition was platted. Growth remained relatively slow in these subdivisions until after the Civil War.

As noted above, the house at 216 1<sup>st</sup> St SW is estimated to have been constructed in ca. 1892 when mention was first made of its construction for William Bacher, a Waverly blacksmith, in the local newspaper. It is also possible that the blacksmith shop was located on the premises. The house first appeared on the 1894 Sanborn Map that year and William and Carrie Bacher (ages 35 and 34) were listed residing in the 200 block of W Water St (1<sup>st</sup> St SW) in the 1895 lowa Census. Their three children, Lula, Louis and Doot, were ages 13, 11 and 7 at the time. Property transfer records show Lot 5 was owned by Elmira Miller from 1887 until 1912 making it likely that the Bachers were renting the house from Miller. By 1913 the city directory published that year shows the house stood vacant with the Bacher family moved north a block to 116 W Water St, next door to the Bacher Blacksmith Shop at 118 W Water St.

Ownership records for 216 1<sup>st</sup> St SW show the house passing to Sara Byrum, a widow, a few years later where she continued to reside until at least 1931 according to the telephone directory published that year. In 1929 Sara transferred the house to her son A.R. Byrum and he and his wife held the house until 1938. It then passed to Otto Zoller and later to his wife Gertrude.




