#### 7. Description

The Van Vlack House at 120 2<sup>nd</sup> Ave SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1898 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. This date is consistent with the building's form but the property transfer records suggest an earlier date, most likely between 1891 and 1894. A building with the same footprint appears on the 1894 Sanborn Map at this intersection. C.A. Van Vlack became owner of Lots 7 and 8 on 5/23/1891 selling it 4/25/1895. A 9/17/1891 news account in the *Bremer County Independent* several months after the house was purchased notes Van Vlack "has built an addition to his house on the West side" indicating that house was already present at the time. The 1895 lowa Census shows Charles Van Vlack residing in the Third Ward making it likely that he was living at this house. These public records confirm the likelihood that 1888 is an accurate construction date.

The Van Vlack House is an example of the vernacular Gable-Front-and-Wing 1½-Story house form. The house has a stone foundation with narrow clapboard-style vinyl siding and corner board time on the walls. The house has a moderate pitched intersecting gabled roof with clipped-gable peaks and moderate-wide eaves. The roof has no dormers. The porch tucked in the right-hand ell has a broad gabled roof and has been enclosed with matching siding on the closed balustrade and gable end, continuous 1/1 double-hung windows above the rail and narrow, square columns resting on the rail. The off-set entrance is at the west end and skirting has been replaced with poured concrete or parged block. An attached garage with a broad, sidegabled roof housing two bays is located at the east end of the house. It has matching vinyl clad walls with regular and extended height overhead doors facing 2<sup>nd</sup> Ave SW and an added workshop space at the east end.

Fenestration includes widely spaced single and paired tall, 1/1 double-hung windows of various sizes, arranged both asymmetrically and symmetrically on the facades. The front façade has had a bay window modified or added. The center bay now has a large single light with narrow 1/1 windows to either side, all set beneath a hipped roof. It is possible the single light replaces an earlier cottage style window with a horizontal upper sash.

#### 8. Significance

The Van Vlack House at 120 2<sup>nd</sup> Ave SW derives significance as a contributing resource in the Sturdevant SW Historic District under both Criteria A (Community Development) and C (Architecture). The historic district qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as a well-preserved collection of mid and late 19th century and early 20th century architectural styles and vernacular house forms located in Waverly's southwest residential neighborhood. The neighborhood developed as a middle class and working class residential district from the late 1850s through the mid-20th century.

Historical Background for Waverly<sup>1</sup>

Waverly was established in 1853 along the Cedar River in Waverly Township located in southeastern Bremer County. It was designated as the county seat for Bremer County the same year that the county was officially

organized and was formally incorporated in 1859. Like most lowa towns established before the Civil War, growth during the early 1860s was deferred until after the war came to a close. Waverly's first railroad, the Cedar Falls and Minnesota Railroad was extended to Waverly in 1864. Eventually track was also laid for other branch lines and an electric interurban. By 1917 track for branch lines was absorbed by the Chicago and Great Western Railroad and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad. Track for the electric interurban – the Waterloo, Cedar Falls, and Northern – was laid in 1910 but usage was never as substantial as predicted.

Waverly grew in the manner typical of other lowa county seats in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century. Its commercial center extended along the east-west route of Bremer Avenue on both sides of the Bremer Avenue Bridge that crossed the L-shaped course of the Cedar River as it passed through the center of town. The county courthouse was located outside of the commercial area on a slight prominence at the east end of Bremer Avenue. Residential districts grew up in the four quadrants formed by the intersecting main street and river. The broad, generally flat profile of both the business district and early residential neighborhoods saw the regular occurrence of flooding resulting in the gradual replacement of most first generation frame building stock. German immigrants were among the largest ethnic group to populate Waverly during the 19<sup>th</sup> century establishing religious institutions with ethnic affiliations such as St. Paul's Lutheran Church in the northwest quadrant, St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in southeast quadrant, and the German Methodist Church.

Bremer County and its county seat of Waverly prospered during the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century becoming a retail and professional services center for Bremer County and sections of adjacent Butler County. The county's standing as the "Dairy Spot of Iowa," gave rise to a number of dairy industries including a manufacturing plant operated by the Carnation Milk Products Company for the production of condensed milk in the 1920s. Population stood at 16,300 people in 1900 before the growth rate slowed before World War I. By 1930 population topped 17,000. Expansion of a Lutheran seminary in Waverly first located in the community in 1879 through the relocation of Wartburg College to the community in 1939 was a cultural and economic stimulus for the community. Waverly continued to add a 1,000 people per decade until 1950 when the post-War boom saw growth accelerate to more than 21,000 by 1960. During the past 50 years population has slowed somewhat topping out at 23,325 in 2000.

Historical Background for the Van Vlack House at 120 2nd Ave SW

The Van Vlack House is located in the southwest quadrant of Waverly that includes additions platted by early Waverly settlers, Ira Sturdevant and his son William Sturdevant. The Sturdevant family moved to the unsettled area along the Cedar River in the mid-1850s. Ira received a 40-acre federal land grant based on his military service in the War of 1812. William acquired 80 acres of adjoining land to the north of his father's 40-acre parcel. In 1857 the William Sturdevant's Addition was laid out and in 1860 the Ira Sturdevant Addition was platted. Growth remained relatively slow in these subdivisions until after the Civil War.

The house at 120 2<sup>nd</sup> Ave SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1898 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. However, property transfer records suggest a date between 1891 and 1894. Charles A. Van Vlack became owner of Lots 7 and 8 on 5/23/1891 selling them 4/25/1895. A building with the same footprint appears on the 1894 Sanborn Map at this intersection. The 1895 lowa Census shows Charles Van Vlack, attorney, residing in the Third Ward making it likely that he was living at this house.

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After Van Vlack's ownership, the property changed hands several times with Carrie Moore, widow of Naaman Moore, acquiring it from H.R. Healy and his wife Clara on 5/6/1905. The 1913 city directory shows Mrs. Moore and her three daughters residing there. Charlotte was a teacher; May worked for Morse & Munger Abstract Co.; and Viola was also a teacher. Carrie held onto the property until 1908 when it passed to Viola and May. In 1915 Mrs. Moore died and in 1922, the property was sold by Viola and May to Elizabeth Amundson who with her husband Sander occupied the property until 1946 when it was transferred to Norma and Harry Bodeker.

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

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
