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7. Description

The Couse-Burr House at 507 2nd Street SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1880 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. However, the building appears on both the 1868 bird's-eye view map and in a drawing contained in the 1875 *Bremer County Atlas*. Henry H. Couse appears residing in Washington Township in 1860 and the Ira Sturdevant Addition in which the house is located, was platted February the same year. Property transfer records show H.H. Couse acquiring the lots for this house on 7/6/1867. Together these sources suggest the house was built sometime between 1867 and 1868. The design for the house is consistent with pre and post-Civil War dwellings making it most likely that the house was built shortly before 1868. A date of ca. 1867 has, therefore, been assigned to the Couse-Burr House.

The house is an example of the Tuscan variation of the Italianate Style. This style uses a hipped roof, 2-story house form with a belvedere or cupola at the center of its low-pitched roof along with distinctive brackets along the wide cornice and deep eaves. The Couse-Burr House has a parged stone foundation with the original clapboard clad walls now covered in asbestos siding (Transite®). The original frame corner pilasters extend from the foundation to the second story cornice line. Four sets of decorative paired brackets extend along the north, west and south facades as well as along all of the cornices of the hipped roof, 2-story rear wing. A small undated side-gabled 1-story wing is located on the south side of the house. Original hipped roof porches remain on the west and north facades of the main block and along the north side of the rear wing. Each retains its original turned porch columns and spindled balustrade with replacement entrance steps facing the street on the two porches on the main block. Both were used as a main entrance at one time when the house numbered first off of Clay Street (4th Ave SW) and later and currently off Elm Street (2nd St SW). The other Italianate feature of the house is the belvedere. The frame detailing on this feature includes paired miniature pilasters at the outer corners, oval windows and replacement sash in the horizontal openings. The design for the belvedere is shorter than is typical for such Italianate features. Paired small-scale brackets line the cornice beneath a low-pitched hipped roof.

Fenestration includes a mix of 1/1 and 4/1 double-hung window units, all using the original openings. A few non-visible openings may have been closed when the current asbestos siding was installed in the mid-20th century. The property has a double-bay frame garage constructed in the late 20th century. It has a broad, moderate pitched front gable roof with a double-wide overhead door. The siding appears to be clapboard style vinyl siding. It is considered noncontributing.

8. Significance

The Couse-Burr House at 507 2nd Street SW derives significance under Criterion B for its association with Henry Harlington Couse, Waverly pioneer and the house's builder in ca. 1865 and with Henry S. Burr, a co-founder and cashier for the First National Bank of Waverly. The house is also significant as a contributing resource in the Sturdevant SW Historic District under both Criteria A and C. The historic district qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as a well-preserved collection of mid to late 19th century and early 20th century architectural styles and vernacular house forms located in Waverly's southwest residential neighborhood. The neighborhood developed as a middle class and working class residential district from the late 1850s through the mid-20th century.

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Historical Background for Waverly¹

Waverly was established in 1853 along the Cedar River in Waverly Township located in southeastern Bremer County. It was designated as the county seat for Bremer County the same year that the county was officially organized and was formally incorporated in 1859. Like most Iowa towns established before the Civil War, growth during the early 1860s was deferred until after the war came to a close. Waverly's first railroad, the Cedar Falls and Minnesota Railroad was extended to Waverly in 1864. Eventually track was also laid for other branch lines and an electric interurban. By 1917 track for branch lines was absorbed by the Chicago and Great Western Railroad and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad. Track for the electric interurban – the Waterloo, Cedar Falls, and Northern – was laid in 1910 but usage was never as substantial as predicted.

Waverly grew in the manner typical of other lowa county seats in the late 19th and early 20th century. Its commercial center extended along the east-west route of Bremer Avenue on both sides of the Bremer Avenue Bridge that crossed the L-shaped course of the Cedar River as it passed through the center of town. The county courthouse was located outside of the commercial area on a slight prominence at the east end of Bremer Avenue. Residential districts grew up in the four quadrants formed by the intersecting main street and river. The broad, generally flat profile of both the business district and early residential neighborhoods saw the regular occurrence of flooding resulting in the gradual replacement of most first generation frame building stock. German immigrants were among the largest ethnic group to populate Waverly during the 19th century establishing religious institutions with ethnic affiliations such as St. Paul's Lutheran Church in the northwest quadrant, St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in southeast quadrant, and the German Methodist Church.

Bremer County and its county seat of Waverly prospered during the late 19th and early 20th century becoming a retail and professional services center for Bremer County and sections of adjacent Butler County. The county's standing as the "Dairy Spot of Iowa," gave rise to a number of dairy industries including a manufacturing plant operated by the Carnation Milk Products Company for the production of condensed milk in the 1920s. Population stood at 16,300 people in 1900 before the growth rate slowed before World War I. By 1930 population topped 17,000. Expansion of a Lutheran seminary in Waverly first located in the community in 1879 through the relocation of Wartburg College to the community in 1939 was a cultural and economic stimulus for the community. Waverly continued to add a 1,000 people per decade until 1950 when the post-War boom saw growth accelerate to more than 21,000 by 1960. During the past 50 years population has slowed somewhat topping out at 23,325 in 2000.

Historical Background for the Couse-Burr House at 507 2nd Street SW

The Couse-Burr House at 507 2nd Street SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1880 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. However, various records identified previously show the house to have been built in c. 1867. Henry Harlington Couse (4/26/1804 - 12/28/1880) and his wife Caroline Couse (1/31/1806 - 6/20/1895). According to records at the Bremer County IAGen Web Site (available online at: http://iagenweb.org/bremer/cems/notes.htm), Harlington Cemetery was platted by H. S. Hoover under the direction of H.H. Couse and his wife Caroline, then owners of the property. The plot was recorded October 30, 1865. Mr. Couse died in 1880; his son-in-law Mr. S. H. Curtis purchased the cemetery. In 1921 the city of

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Waverly purchased the cemetery from the estate of S. H. Curtis. Sidney H. Curtis had married Sarah Couse in 1856 in Waverly. Both H.H. Couse and his wife Caroline are buried in Harlington Cemetery on a high prominence within the cemetery.

After H.H. Couse died in 1880, his widow continued to occupy the property for another nine years. In 1889 property transfer records show Caroline Couse selling the house to H.S. Burr who with his wife Fannie occupied the house. Burr was a banker by trade and was a co-founder of the First National Bank of Waverly. He eventually became president of the bank. Burr's wife died in 1900 and he continued to reside here with two children. The house was addressed as 214 West Clay Street (4th Ave SW) at the time. After his wife's death, Burr continued to reside here with his son and daughter. The house eventually passed through several members of the Burr family including Howard B. Burr, the architect of Waverly High School. Eventually the house was sold to members of the Thompson family. Of note is the fact that Burr was one of several bankers who resided along 2nd St SW; others included William Babcock who built the house across the street and Louis Case who lived in the 200 block of 2nd St SW.

By 1913, the house had been renumbered as 507 South Elm Street (2nd St SW) and was occupied by M.L. Stebbins and his wife Nora. The city directory published that year shows Stebbins owning a harness shop a few blocks away at 113 West Bremer Ave. Property transfer records show Stebbins buying this house from the Thompsons in 1920 and continuing to reside here until his death in 1938 at the age of 92. He was known as Waverly's last surviving Civil War veteran when he died.

After his death, Stebbins' estate sold the house to Emma Fractow in 1939. It passed to William Rothe in 1943 and three years later in 1946 to William and Bertha Kaiser.



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

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
Historic Image: Atlas of Bremer County, Iowa, 1875.




