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### 7. Description

The Ebert House at 714 1st Ave SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1925 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. This date is consistent with the building's form and design. Property transfer records and newspaper accounts, however, suggest a slightly earlier date of 1922. George Ebert was the likely builder for the house in 1922 with his daughter Cora owning the lot. She acquired Lot 6 on 4/4/1922 from Helen Ellis. Several days later on 4/14/1922 a news account lists George as already having excavation completed for the "new residence which he will build on his lot on West Ellsworth Street." By 6/30/1922, the paper noted that the new bungalow Ebert was building for himself on West Ellsworth was being rapidly completed and that "it will not be very long now until he can move into it." It should be noted that daughter Cora resided with her family in the 1913 directory and likely lived with her parents when the new bungalow was finished. The likely date for completion of this house based on public records is 1922.

The Cora Ebert House is an example of a vernacular Front-Gabled Roof, 1½-Story house form. The building has a clay tile block foundation likely manufactured in one of the Mason City tile works. Narrow-width clapboard-style vinyl siding and corner board trim cover the walls. It has a broad front-gabled roof with a steep pitch, wide eaves, and large shed roofed attic dormers on both the east and west slopes. A low-pitched, broad front-gabled porch nearly spans the front. It has a tile-block foundation with a closed balustrade covered in matching vinyl siding. The upper walls feature paired 1/1 windows set between half-height square columns that flank the centered entrance door.

Fenestration includes single and paired 1/1 double-hung windows of various sizes as well as large single-light horizontal windows. A single 1/1 double-hung window is centered in the front gable and pairs of similar windows are in the dormers. The original low-pitched double-bay garage is at the northwest corner of the house. The depth of the garage has been extended with a shallow shed-roofed addition to accommodate the longer length of later cars. The garage is considered contributing.

#### 8. Significance

Cora Ebert House at 714 1st Ave SW derives significance as a contributing resource in the Sturdevant SW Historic District, which qualifies for the National Register under both Criteria A (Community Development) and C (Architecture). The garage is considered contributing. The historic district is a well-preserved collection of mid and late 19th century and early 20th century architectural styles and vernacular house forms located in Waverly's southwest residential neighborhood. The neighborhood developed as a middle class and working class residential district from the late 1850s through the mid-20th century. The garage is also considered contributing.

#### Historical Background for Waverly<sup>1</sup>

Waverly was established in 1853 along the Cedar River in Waverly Township located in southeastern Bremer County. It was designated as the county seat for Bremer County the same year that the county was officially

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organized and was formally incorporated in 1859. Like most lowa towns established before the Civil War, growth during the early 1860s was deferred until after the war came to a close. Waverly's first railroad, the Cedar Falls and Minnesota Railroad was extended to Waverly in 1864. Eventually track was also laid for other branch lines and an electric interurban. By 1917 track for branch lines was absorbed by the Chicago and Great Western Railroad and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad. Track for the electric interurban – the Waterloo, Cedar Falls, and Northern – was laid in 1910 but usage was never as substantial as predicted.

Waverly grew in the manner typical of other lowa county seats in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century. Its commercial center extended along the east-west route of Bremer Avenue on both sides of the Bremer Avenue Bridge that crossed the L-shaped course of the Cedar River as it passed through the center of town. The county courthouse was located outside of the commercial area on a slight prominence at the east end of Bremer Avenue. Residential districts grew up in the four quadrants formed by the intersecting main street and river. The broad, generally flat profile of both the business district and early residential neighborhoods saw the regular occurrence of flooding resulting in the gradual replacement of most first generation frame building stock. German immigrants were among the largest ethnic group to populate Waverly during the 19<sup>th</sup> century establishing religious institutions with ethnic affiliations such as St. Paul's Lutheran Church in the northwest quadrant, St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in southeast quadrant, and the German Methodist Church.

Bremer County and its county seat of Waverly prospered during the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century becoming a retail and professional services center for Bremer County and sections of adjacent Butler County. The county's standing as the "Dairy Spot of Iowa," gave rise to a number of dairy industries including a manufacturing plant operated by the Carnation Milk Products Company for the production of condensed milk in the 1920s. Population stood at 16,300 people in 1900 before the growth rate slowed before World War I. By 1930 population topped 17,000. Expansion of a Lutheran seminary in Waverly first located in the community in 1879 through the relocation of Wartburg College to the community in 1939 was a cultural and economic stimulus for the community. Waverly continued to add a 1,000 people per decade until 1950 when the post-War boom saw growth accelerate to more than 21,000 by 1960. During the past 50 years population has slowed somewhat topping out at 23,325 in 2000.

Historical Background for the Ebert House at 714 1st Ave SW

The Cora Ebert House is located in the southwest quadrant of Waverly that includes additions platted by early Waverly settlers, Ira Sturdevant and his son William Sturdevant. The Sturdevant family moved to the unsettled area along the Cedar River in the mid-1850s. Ira received a 40-acre federal land grant based on his military service in the War of 1812. William acquired 80 acres of adjoining land to the north of his father's 40-acre parcel. In 1857 the William Sturdevant's Addition was laid out and in 1860 the Ira Sturdevant Addition was platted. Growth remained relatively slow in these subdivisions until after the Civil War.

The Ebert House at 714 1<sup>st</sup> Ave SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1925 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. Though this date is consistent with the building's form and design, property transfer records and newspaper accounts suggest a slightly earlier date of 1922. George Ebert, Cora's father, was the builder for the house in 1922 as noted above. She acquired Lot 6 on 4/4/1922 from Helen Ellis. Several days later on 4/14/1922 newspaper accounts list George building a house on W Ellsworth (1<sup>st</sup> Ave SW) and on 6/30/1922 the house is listed as "being rapidly completed." Although the house was listed as a residence for George Ebert, the home was likely occupied by Cora as well. Her father George worked as a

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millwright in the 1913 city directory but a short time later a news account published 3/26/1914 identified him as setting up a new construction business (article at right). Cora sold the property in 1927 and by 1931, the telephone directory lists George Ebert as residing at 317 6<sup>th</sup> St NW. City directory records in 1913 list Miss Cora Ebert as a school teacher.

On 8/29/1927, Cora transferred the house to A.W. Munstermann who six years later sold the house to H.W. (Herman) Graening and his wife Bertha S. Graening. They resided here together until his death in 1965 and she continued here until 1969. At that time, the house was sold to Roland and Mildred Mueller.

George H. Ebert has leased the building formerly occupied by Edgar Brown as a carpenter shop, just east of the Publishing House. George is a competent workman in all various lines. He can build a house, move a safe, or a whole printing office and do it well and he solicits a share of your patronage. Call op his at the shop or telephone his residence when you have a job in his line. He will look after it satisfactorily.

According to the current owners, the Muellers sold the property to Floyd and Anna Bowdish on September 9, 1971. Floyd died on May 24, 1983. Richard F. And Trude E. Busse entered into a contract to purchase the property from Anna Bowdish on September 14, 1984. By warranty deed dated July 12, 1989 Richard and Trude Busse acquired title to the property. Richard was retired from Chamberlain Manufacturing in Waterloo. By warranty deed on July 12, 1989 the Busses sold the property to Lois A. McElroy Lindell, an adjunct instructor, instructional technology, and her husband Terrence J. Lindell, a professor of history at Wartburg College in 2015.

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
