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Pratt, William and Eliza, House	Bremer	
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7. Description

The William and Eliza Pratt House at 222 3rd St SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1888 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. This date is consistent with the building's form, design, millwork details and window configurations. The slightly earlier date is also is suggested by the 1885 lowa Census that shows William and Eliza Pratt residing at this address with their daughter in that year. The house footprint is also confirmed by the 1894 Sanborn Map of Waverly. The house was originally numbered as 222 Linn St South and is dated at ca. 1885.

The Pratt House is an example of a vernacular Gable-Front-and-Wing 2-story house form. The building has a stone foundation with parged covering and narrow clapboard-style vinyl siding on the walls. The house has a low-to-moderate pitched intersecting-gable roof with a right-hand ell filled by a shed-on-hipped roof porch that extends south covering the first bay of the side-gable wing. The porch retains the original pediment over the entrance opening and the complex patterned spindled frieze along the porch roof edge is intact as are the turned porch post and half-posts.

Fenestration includes 2/2 double-hung window units of several sizes throughout the house widely spaced or in pairs. These are typical of window installations in the 1870s and 1880s and are likely original. The feature window group is the canted bay window on the front gable wing with bay windows stacked the first and second floors with a foundation on the ground level. A flat metal roof appears above the upper level and metal skirting above the lower level roof line. The 1-story rear kitchen wing has a hipped roof with a 2/2 window placed in the canted corner and a small hipped-roof entrance bay constructed at an unknown date.

The house has a large detached garage completed in 1998. It measures 30 x 24 feet, is clad in matching vinyl siding, as a broad side-gabled roof, and is located west of the house where the two overhead doors open onto 2^{nd} Ave SW. It is considered a noncontributing resource.

8. Significance

The William and Eliza Pratt House at 222 3rd St SW derives significance as a contributing resource in the Sturdevant SW Historic District under both Criteria A and C. The historic district qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as a well-preserved collection of mid and late 19th century and early 20th century architectural styles and vernacular house forms located in Waverly's southwest residential neighborhood. The neighborhood developed as a middle class and working class residential district from the late 1850s through the mid-20th century. The garage is noncontributing.

Historical Background for Waverly¹

Waverly was established in 1853 along the Cedar River in Waverly Township located in southeastern Bremer County. It was designated as the county seat for Bremer County the same year that the county was officially organized and was formally incorporated in 1859. Like most lowa towns established before the Civil War, growth during the early 1860s was deferred until after the war came to a close. Waverly's first railroad, the

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Cedar Falls and Minnesota Railroad was extended to Waverly in 1864. Eventually track was also laid for other branch lines and an electric interurban. By 1917 track for branch lines was absorbed by the Chicago and Great Western Railroad and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad. Track for the electric interurban – the Waterloo, Cedar Falls, and Northern – was laid in 1910 but usage was never as substantial as predicted.

Waverly grew in the manner typical of other lowa county seats in the late 19th and early 20th century. Its commercial center extended along the east-west route of Bremer Avenue on both sides of the Bremer Avenue Bridge that crossed the L-shaped course of the Cedar River as it passed through the center of town. The county courthouse was located outside of the commercial area on a slight prominence at the east end of Bremer Avenue. Residential districts grew up in the four quadrants formed by the intersecting main street and river. The broad, generally flat profile of both the business district and early residential neighborhoods saw the regular occurrence of flooding resulting in the gradual replacement of most first generation frame building stock. German immigrants were among the largest ethnic group to populate Waverly during the 19th century establishing religious institutions with ethnic affiliations such as St. Paul's Lutheran Church in the northwest quadrant, St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in southeast quadrant, and the German Methodist Church.

Bremer County and its county seat of Waverly prospered during the late 19th and early 20th century becoming a retail and professional services center for Bremer County and sections of adjacent Butler County. The county's standing as the "Dairy Spot of Iowa," gave rise to a number of dairy industries including a manufacturing plant operated by the Carnation Milk Products Company for the production of condensed milk in the 1920s. Population stood at 16,300 people in 1900 before the growth rate slowed before World War I. By 1930 population topped 17,000. Expansion of a Lutheran seminary in Waverly first located in the community in 1879 through the relocation of Wartburg College to the community in 1939 was a cultural and economic stimulus for the community. Waverly continued to add a 1,000 people per decade until 1950 when the post-War boom saw growth accelerate to more than 21,000 by 1960. During the past 50 years population has slowed somewhat topping out at 23,325 in 2000.

Historical Background for the William and Eliza Pratt House at 222 3rd St SW:

The William and Eliza Pratt House at 222 3rd St SW is located in the southwest quadrant of Waverly that includes additions platted by Ira Sturdevant and his son William Sturdevant. The Sturdevant family moved to the unsettled area along the Cedar River in the mid-1850s. Ira received a 40-acre federal land grant based on his military service in the War of 1812. William acquired 80 acres of adjoining land to the north of his father's 40-acre parcel. In 1857 the William Sturdevant's Addition was laid out and in 1860 the Ira Sturdevant Addition was platted. Settlement remained sparse in the additions until after the Civil War.

The Pratt House is estimated to have been constructed in 1888 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. This date is consistent with the vernacular architectural form of the building, design elements such as the millwork detailing and window designs. A slightly earlier date of ca. 1885 is suggested by the presence of the Pratt family at this legal description in the 1885 Iowa Census. William Pratt was listed as a millwright and also happened to be the census enumerator for the Third Ward in that census when he, his wife and their daughter Harriet/"Hattie" were residing in that ward. A decade later during the 1895 Iowa Census, Eliza and Harriet were still living in the Third Ward but William had died. Eliza passed away sometime prior to 1915 when Harriet Pratt transferred the house to Caroline M. Spaulding and her husband George A. Spaulding, a commercial traveler in the 1913 city directory. The Spauldings resided at this house in intervening years with

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telephone directories showing them here in 1924 and 1926. In 1947 the Spauldings transferred the house to Caroline Steege and the following year, she resold it to Robert and Helen Goard.







