#### 7. Description

The H.F. and Emma Luesenhop House at 200 6<sup>th</sup> St SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1880 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. A building first appears on this site in the 1875 *Bremer Co. Atlas* city map for Waverly; by 1894, the front half of the house had been added. Property transfer records show William Ward Smith acquiring all of Lots 1 and 2 in Block 17 in 1902 from Minnie Case and re-selling the north half with 200 6<sup>th</sup> St SW on it to Emma Luesenhop on 11-7-1905. She and her husband H.F. Luesenhop, likely updated the house at that time or built a new residence. Because of the form and design elements in the house, a ca. 1905 date is attributed to the building rather than the Assessor's date of 1880.

The Luesenhop House is an example of a vernacular Hipped Roof 2-Story house form. This example uses a moderate pitched hipped roof with alterations in openings and porch arrangements producing an asymmetrical façade. The house is now clad in wide clapboard-style aluminum siding with replacement double-hung 1/1 windows in most openings. On the front façade, the original porch has been modified with the introduction of brick pedestals and a brick foundation for the smaller entrance porch. A pair of original square porch posts appears to have been shortened and placed on brick pedestals with matching brick used on the wall sections to either side of the front door. A Queen Anne Style Cottage Window is placed to the right of the entrance with beveled leaded glass in the upper horizontal sash and a large square single-light below. To the south of the entrance, a modern angular bay window has been installed. On upper level and side facades, 1/1 double-hung windows are used.

A front-gable frame carriage house is located at the rear of this property with a carport attached along the east wall. The rarity of this 2-story, frame front-gable city barn adds significance to its status as a contributing resource.

#### 8. Significance

The H.F. and Emma Luesenhop House at 200 6<sup>th</sup> St SW derives significance as a contributing resource in the Sturdevant SW Historic District under both Criteria A and C. The historic district qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as a well-preserved collection of mid to late 19th century and early 20th century architectural styles and vernacular house forms located in Waverly's southwest residential neighborhood. The neighborhood developed as a middle class and working class residential district from the late 1850s through the mid-20th century. The carriage house is considered a contributing resource.

#### Historical Background for Waverly<sup>1</sup>

Waverly was established in 1853 along the Cedar River in Waverly Township located in southeastern Bremer County. It was designated as the county seat for Bremer County the same year that the county was officially organized and was formally incorporated in 1859. Like most lowa towns established before the Civil War, growth during the early 1860s was deferred until after the war came to a close. Waverly's first railroad, the Cedar Falls and Minnesota Railroad was extended to Waverly in 1864. Eventually track was also laid for other

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branch lines and an electric interurban. By 1917 track for branch lines was absorbed by the Chicago and Great Western Railroad and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad. Track for the electric interurban – the Waterloo, Cedar Falls, and Northern – was laid in 1910 but usage was never as substantial as predicted.

Waverly grew in the manner typical of other lowa county seats in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century. Its commercial center extended along the east-west route of Bremer Avenue on both sides of the Bremer Avenue Bridge that crossed the L-shaped course of the Cedar River as it passed through the center of town. The county courthouse was located outside of the commercial area on a slight prominence at the east end of Bremer Avenue. Residential districts grew up in the four quadrants formed by the intersecting main street and river. The broad, generally flat profile of both the business district and early residential neighborhoods saw the regular occurrence of flooding resulting in the gradual replacement of most first generation frame building stock. German immigrants were among the largest ethnic group to populate Waverly during the 19<sup>th</sup> century establishing religious institutions with ethnic affiliations such as St. Paul's Lutheran Church in the northwest quadrant, St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in southeast quadrant, and the German Methodist Church.

Bremer County and its county seat of Waverly prospered during the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> century becoming a retail and professional services center for Bremer County and sections of adjacent Butler County. The county's standing as the "Dairy Spot of Iowa," gave rise to a number of dairy industries including a manufacturing plant operated by the Carnation Milk Products Company for the production of condensed milk in the 1920s. Population stood at 16,300 people in 1900 before the growth rate slowed before World War I. By 1930 population topped 17,000. Expansion of a Lutheran seminary in Waverly first located in the community in 1879 through the relocation of Wartburg College to the community in 1939 was a cultural and economic stimulus for the community. Waverly continued to add a 1,000 people per decade until 1950 when the post-War boom saw growth accelerate to more than 21,000 by 1960. During the past 50 years population has slowed somewhat topping out at 23,325 in 2000.

Historical Background for the Luesenhop House at 200 6<sup>th</sup> St SW

The Henry F. and Emma Luesenhop House at 200 6<sup>th</sup> Street SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1880 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. Property transfer records combined with interpretation of the house's footprint and design detailing, suggest the house was more likely constructed in ca. 1905 for local real estate agent H.F. Luesenhop and his wife Emma for their large family. Rev. William Ward Smith House located immediately to the south. The Luesenhop House stood immediately next door to the south. By 1913, daughters Lillian worked at the Waterloo, Cedar Falls and Northern RR Station and Flora worked as a nurse while children Edwin, Irene and Meta were not employed. City telephone directories show the Luesenhop family residing here until ca. 1926. In 1932, the house passed to Hulda Luesenhop (family relationship unknown) who sold the house in 1939 to Flora Wigton, likely Flora Luesenhop. She held the property until 1959 when she transferred it to her sisters Lillian and Irene Luesenhop. Lillian was listed as residing here in the 1961 city directory. In 1969 the property passed to Arlean and Walter Sohle from Irene Luesenhop's estate.

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
