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7. Description.

The Edward H. Thiemann House at 621 W Bremer Ave SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1914 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. E. H. Thiemann acquired the property from the heirs of Jessie Haase on 8/22/1914. The address is listed in the telephone directories in 1924 and 1926. The 1915 Sanborn Map does not depict this block. A newspaper account in the *Bremer County Independent* on 12/17/1914 identifies Thiemann as having the *******************************foundation walls and wood framing completed on his new house in the Third ward making it likely it was completed later in 1915.

The house is an example of a vernacular Hipped Roof, 2-Story house form popularly known as the American Four-Square. The building has a rock-faced concrete block foundation for the main house and narrow width wood clapboard siding on the walls. The house has a moderate-pitched hipped roof with slightly flared edges, deep eaves, and hipped roof attic dormers on north, east and west slopes, each clad in square-cut shingles. The rear roof section ends in a gable end that spans the full façade; fish-scale wood shingles clad the walls and a balcony has been added at the attic level. On the front façade, a low-pitched hipped roof porch spans the front façade with four slender piers evenly spaced across the front. The closed balustrade has matching clapboard siding and the area above the balustrade has been enclosed with clear class panels. The entrance steps centered on the front with two entrance doors leading into the house. The original porch skirting panels have very narrowly spaced vertical lath.

Fenestration includes widely spaced 1/1 double-hung window units of various sizes on both the lower and upper level with a pair of sash along the east side between the first and second floors at the staircase landing height. The balance of the first floor has a mix of sizes for the 1/1 windows. The feature windows are two cottage windows on the front façade with a horizontal upper sash over a larger square window. A pair of large 1/1 units are located along the west façade on the main level with a mix of sizes for double-hung windows elsewhere. The attic dormers each have a pair of small 1/1 double-hung sash. A second entrance is located on the east façade leading to the kitchen and basement level.

A free-standing 2-story city barn or carriage house is located at the rear of the property and was likely built at the same time the house was constructed in 1914 or 1915. It has a gabled roof with a wagon door on the north façade and an overhead door facing west in the gable end. The frame walls are clad in board-and-batten wood siding. Hinged doors are located on the upper-level with single-light square windows in the gable peaks. The barn is considered a contributing resource.

8. Significance

The Edward H. Thiemann House at 621 W Bremer Ave SW is significant individually and as a contributing resource in the Sturdevant SW Historic District under both Criteria A and C. The district qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as a well-preserved collection of mid and late 19th century and early 20th century architectural styles and vernacular house forms located in Waverly's southwest residential neighborhood. The neighborhood developed as a middle class and working class residential district from the late 1850s through the mid-20th century. The carriage house/city barn is also considered a contributing resource.

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Historical Background for Waverly¹

Waverly was established in 1853 along the Cedar River in Waverly Township located in southeastern Bremer County. It was designated as the county seat for Bremer County the same year that the county was officially organized and was formally incorporated in 1859. Like most lowa towns established before the Civil War, growth during the early 1860s was deferred until after the war came to a close. Waverly's first railroad, the Cedar Falls and Minnesota Railroad was extended to Waverly in 1864. Eventually track was also laid for other branch lines and an electric interurban. By 1917 track for branch lines was absorbed by the Chicago and Great Western Railroad and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad. Track for the electric interurban – the Waterloo, Cedar Falls, and Northern – was laid in 1910 but usage was never as substantial as predicted.

Waverly grew in the manner typical of other lowa county seats in the late 19th and early 20th century. Its commercial center extended along the east-west route of Bremer Avenue on both sides of the Bremer Avenue Bridge that crossed the L-shaped course of the Cedar River as it passed through the center of town. The county courthouse was located outside of the commercial area on a slight prominence at the east end of Bremer Avenue. Residential districts grew up in the four quadrants formed by the intersecting main street and river. The broad, generally flat profile of both the business district and early residential neighborhoods saw the regular occurrence of flooding resulting in the gradual replacement of most first generation frame building stock. German immigrants were among the largest ethnic group to populate Waverly during the 19th century establishing religious institutions with ethnic affiliations such as St. Paul's Lutheran Church in the northwest quadrant, St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in southeast quadrant, and the German Methodist Church.

Bremer County and its county seat of Waverly prospered during the late 19th and early 20th century becoming a retail and professional services center for Bremer County and sections of adjacent Butler County. The county's standing as the "Dairy Spot of Iowa," gave rise to a number of dairy industries including a manufacturing plant operated by the Carnation Milk Products Company for the production of condensed milk in the 1920s. Population stood at 16,300 people in 1900 before the growth rate slowed before World War I. By 1930 population topped 17,000. Expansion of a Lutheran seminary in Waverly first located in the community in 1879 through the relocation of Wartburg College to the community in 1939 was a cultural and economic stimulus for the community. Waverly continued to add a 1,000 people per decade until 1950 when the post-War boom saw growth accelerate to more than 21,000 by 1960. During the past 50 years population has slowed somewhat topping out at 23,325 in 2000.

Historical Background for the Edward H. Thiemann House at 621 W Bremer Ave SW:

The Edward H. Thiemann House at 621 W Bremer Ave SW is located in Block 18 of the William Sturdevant Addition. The southwest quadrant of Waverly includes additions platted by early Waverly settlers, Ira Sturdevant and his son William Sturdevant. The Sturdevant family moved to the unsettled area along the Cedar River in the mid-1850s. Ira received a 40-acre federal land grant based on his military service in the War of 1812. William acquired 80 acres of adjoining land to the north of his father's 40-acre parcel. In 1857 the William Sturdevant's Addition was laid out and in 1860 the Ira Sturdevant Addition was platted. Growth remained relatively slow in these subdivisions until after the Civil War.

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The Thiemann House was estimated to have been constructed in 1914 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. Property transfer records show the lot was transferred from Jessie Haase and other heirs of Lillian Ellis Clarke to Edward H. Thiemann on 8/22/1914. It is likely that Thiemann was originally from Warren Township where several Thiemann family farms were located at the time and where state census records show him growing up. A newspaper story in the *Bremer County Independent* on 12/17/1914 indicates the house is under construction ???????????????????????????????? In September 11, 1915, Thiemann closed his partnership in "Birum and Thiemann", a King Car dealership, to form "E.H. Thiemann Auto Co." which was located on West Bremer Ave. By the late 1920s, Thiemann was working as an auctioneer, frequently handling farm sales. City telephone books show Thiemann and his wife continued to reside at 621 W. Bremer Ave in 1924 and 1926.

In 1927, property transfers show the Thiemanns relocated to a farm in Bremer County selling their W. Bremer Ave house to Linnie Kelley who according to telephone books, does not appear to have resided here. In 1945, Kelley's heirs sold the house to Arthur and Elizabeth Droste who held the house for five years selling it to Otto and Ada Harman on 8/1/1950. 1995 when it passed to their children Karen Schmidt and Virgil C. Hartman.
