

7. Description



The Alfred and Wm. Smith Family House at 202 4th Ave SW is estimated to have been constructed in 1890 according to the Bremer County Assessor's records. This date is slightly late for the building's I-House form. The building footprint appears at the northwest corner of Clay and Elm streets in the 1868 bird's eye view map (see left) and on the 1875 map of Waverly on Lot 1 of Block 9 of the Wm. Sturdevant Addition. It is likely that it was built shortly before 1868 by Warren Morse who held it briefly. It passed into the Alfred Smith family in April 1870 and to William Ward Smith in April 1873. The name for the house is attributed to his family because they held it for the next three decades with it likely used as both a residence and a rental property during that time. These various public records confirm the likelihood that ca.1868 is an accurate construction date.

The Smith House is an example of the vernacular Side-Gabled Roof, 2-story house form commonly referred to as the "I-House" form because it was popularly built in the pre and post-Civil War Years in the states of Indiana, Illinois and Iowa. The house has a newer concrete block foundation with wide vinyl clapboard style

on the walls. The house has several rear 1-story additions including one section that serves as a single-bay side-gable roofed garage opening onto 2nd Street likely used for other purposes when originally built. The main block of the house has a moderate pitched side-gabled roof with a rear half-gable section giving the house a salt-box form. The roof has no dormers. A pediment roof entrance stoop has vertical boards detailing in the gable end with narrow replacement posts supporting the corners and a balustrade made up of moderately spaced square spindles.

Fenestration includes widely spaced single 1/1 double-hung windows likely replacing early multi-light sashes. Several openings also have replacement casement sash and the exterior basement entrance stairs on the west side have a large glass blocked opening leading to the basement door. The property has no detached garage.

8. Significance

As one of the earliest houses in the neighborhood, the Alfred and William Smith Family House at 202 4th Ave SW derives significance as a contributing resource in the Sturdevant SW Historic District under both Criteria A (Community Development) and C (Architecture). The historic district qualifies for the National Register of Historic Places as a well-preserved collection of mid and late 19th century and early 20th century architectural styles and vernacular house forms located in Waverly's southwest residential neighborhood. The neighborhood developed as a middle class and working class residential district from the late 1850s through the mid-20th century.

Historical Background for Waverly¹

Waverly was established in 1853 along the Cedar River in Waverly Township located in southeastern Bremer County. It was designated as the county seat for Bremer County the same year that the county was officially organized and was formally incorporated in 1859. Like most lowa towns established before the Civil War, growth during the early 1860s was deferred until after the war came to a close. Waverly's first railroad, the Cedar Falls and Minnesota Railroad was extended to Waverly in 1864. Eventually track was also laid for other branch lines and an electric interurban. By 1917 track for branch lines was absorbed by the Chicago and Great Western Railroad and the Chicago, Rock Island and Pacific Railroad. Track for the electric interurban – the Waterloo, Cedar Falls, and Northern – was laid in 1910 but usage was never as substantial as predicted.

Waverly grew in the manner typical of other lowa county seats in the late 19th and early 20th century. Its commercial center extended along the east-west route of Bremer Avenue on both sides of the Bremer Avenue Bridge that crossed the L-shaped course of the Cedar River as it passed through the center of town. The county courthouse was located outside of the commercial area on a slight prominence at the east end of Bremer Avenue. Residential districts grew up in the four quadrants formed by the intersecting main street and river. The broad, generally flat profile of both the business district and early residential neighborhoods saw the regular occurrence of flooding resulting in the gradual replacement of most first generation frame building stock. German immigrants were among the largest ethnic group to populate Waverly during the 19th century establishing religious institutions with ethnic affiliations such as St. Paul's Lutheran Church in the northwest quadrant, St. Mary's Roman Catholic Church in southeast quadrant, and the German Methodist Church.

Bremer County and its county seat of Waverly prospered during the late 19th and early 20th century becoming a retail and professional services center for Bremer County and sections of adjacent Butler County. The county's standing as the "Dairy Spot of Iowa," gave rise to a number of dairy industries including a manufacturing plant operated by the Carnation Milk Products Company for the production of condensed milk in the 1920s. Population stood at 16,300 people in 1900 before the growth rate slowed before World War I. By 1930 population topped 17,000. Expansion of a Lutheran seminary in Waverly first located in the community in 1879 through the relocation of Wartburg College to the community in 1939 was a cultural and economic stimulus for the community. Waverly continued to add a 1,000 people per decade until 1950 when the post-War boom saw growth accelerate to more than 21,000 by 1960. During the past 50 years population has slowed somewhat topping out at 23,325 in 2000.

Historical Background for the Alfred and William Smith Family House at 202 4th Ave SW

The Alfred and William Smith Family House is located in the southwest quadrant of Waverly that includes additions platted by early Waverly settlers, Ira Sturdevant and his son William Sturdevant. The Sturdevant family moved to the unsettled area along the Cedar River in the mid-1850s. Ira received a 40-acre federal land grant based on his military service in the War of 1812. William acquired 80 acres of adjoining land to the north of his father's 40-acre parcel. In 1857 the William Sturdevant's Addition was laid out and in 1860 the Ira Sturdevant Addition was platted. Growth remained relatively slow in these subdivisions until after the Civil War.

As noted above, the house at 202 4th Ave SW is estimated to have been constructed in ca. 1868 when it first appeared at the northwest corner of Clay and Elm streets in the 1868 bird's eye view map and on the 1875 map of Waverly on Lot 1 of Block 9 of the Wm. Sturdevant Addition. It is likely that it was built shortly before 1868 by Warren Morse who held the lot briefly. In 1870 the house passed to Alfred Smith and three years later to Rev. William Ward Smith, a former minister for the Waverly Methodist Episcopal Church. Smith's ownership continued with rental occupancy of the building confirmed by 1885 in the Iowa Census records for that year. They show Flavius Patterson, a carpenter, and his wife Margaret residing here along with their six children, ages 3 to 18. Ten years later, the Pattersons continued here with Flavius working as a school janitor possibly for the nearby Waverly High School. Rev. Smith married Caroline (Williams) Hightshoe in 1892 and the couple owned and may have occupied the house briefly before building a new home in 1902 several blocks away at 210 6th St SW.

In 1903, the house passed from the Smiths to R. H. Sewell, an officer with the First National Bank. The Sewell family lived in the 300 block of 2^{nd} Street SW so this may have been a protective or courtesy purchase on behalf of the bank. In 1909, Sewell passed the property to Helena Temple. She and her husband William H. Temple lived in the 400 block of 2^{nd} Street SW so it likely continued use as a rental dwelling.
